The matter of investigating the water rate for the Mount Joy Creamery, and extending the water lines on Marietta Street to the Borough line, was left in the hands of the Water Committee, Mr. Keller, chairman.

A donation of \$5.00 was given to the committee recently formed to care for the men joining the United States service.

It was decided to name the alley recently opened from Frank Street to North Alley, "Nagle Alley," named after the person who donated the ground for street purposes years ago; also that property holders donating ground to the Borough for street purposes shall pay for the drawing up of the Deed.

The Water Rate for the Cold Storage Plant here was fixed at \$35.00 per year.

Bonds will be turned in which have expired in the name of the Strickler Coal fund and deposit funds in a certificate in the Union National Mount Joy Bank.

Council will apply for membership in the Lancaster County Borough's Association, which was just formed. Each Borough is entitled to have one Director on the Board. Mr. Walter Loraw was named the delegate from Mount Joy Borough.

Burgess Hendrix reported collections of \$9.50 for license fees for November.

Arthur Hendrix reported a collection of \$48.00 for fines in November.

Pumping Engineer, George Schütz pumped 5,761,660 gallons of water for the month.

C. H. Dillinger, Board of Health, reported 1 case of Mumps; 3 Whooping Cough, and 2 nuisances corrected. Mr. Paul Stoner was re-appointed as a member of the Board of Health.

Mr. Myers reported lamps too small on Parking Lots and suggested using larger bulbs.

Treasurer H. N. Nissly reports these balances: Boro account, \$13,058.51; Water, \$326.98; Interest, \$72.00.

Council decided to close the street from Manheim Street to the Atlantic Ice Mfg. Co., plant.

The bids recently opened for material for the Fire House were

presented in tabulated form by Mr. John W. Greiner, Architect, and after Council considered them for quite some time, it was thought best to have the Committee of the Fire Company meet with Council before awarding the bids.

A special meeting of Council was therefore called to meet on Wednesday evening, December 5, 1940 at which time the Committee of the Fire Company will meet with Council and bids will no doubt be awarded.

Bills amounting to \$1170.63 were ordered paid.

Both of these gentlemen are noted for their forceful, interesting public speaking and should be heard by all on this occasion.

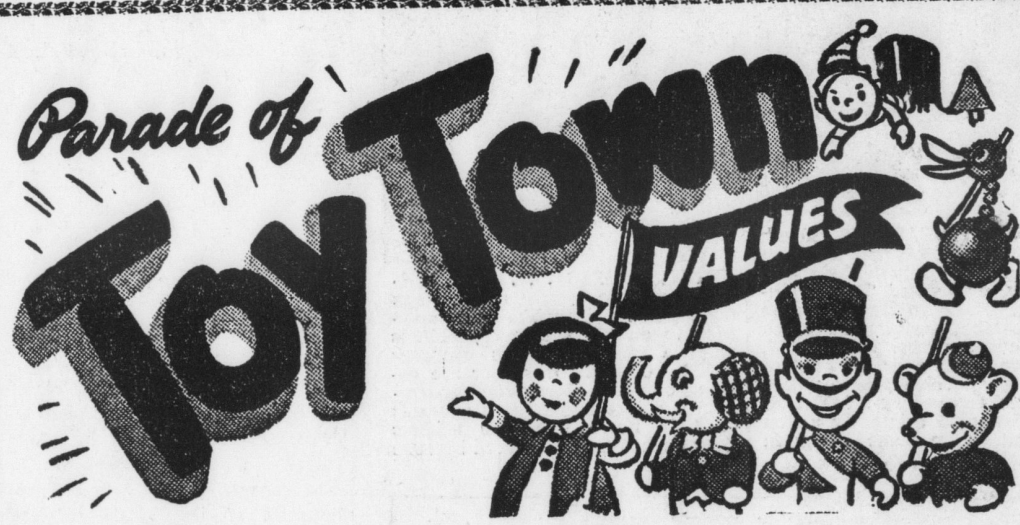
The purpose of this organization and the public meeting is to re-awaken the patriotism of the people of the United States. All America is acting as one man in this
