The Manheim Company had a frozen tank enroute. The Elizabethtown firemen had a chain come off the engine wheel and wind around the axle while our firemen had difficulty in locating the fire as it is out of their district. The fire again started burning late Monday night and firemen from Manheim responded and extinguished the flames.
