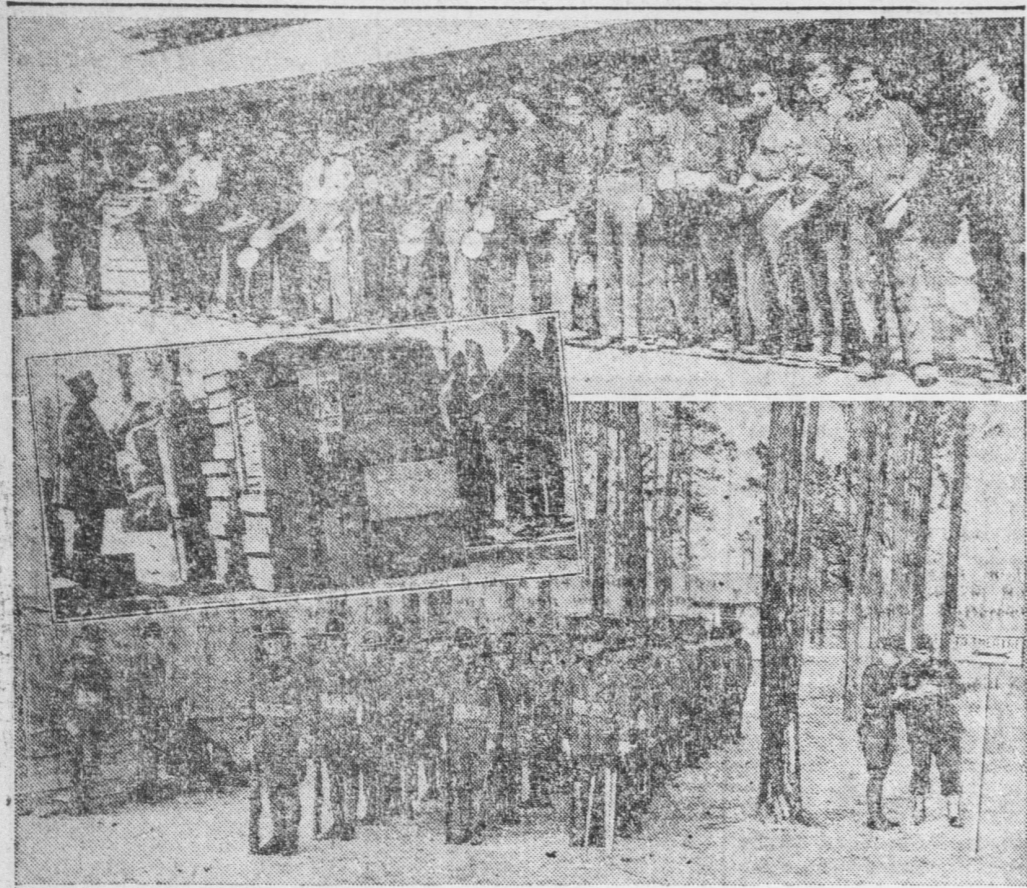


Northern Troops in Southern Camps

COUNCIL WANTS

are at this point in brief. The Council gives the Commission the assurance that it will pay \$750 as provided in the budget toward the services of a town planner any time this year, it will go ahead with the work immediately and "take chances on this or the succeeding Council being sufficiently satisfied with the service" to provide the necessary funds to pay the balance or \$750.
What Planner Will Do?
Appended is what the town planner Russel V. Black will provide and supply for his fee of \$1,500:
1. Acquire or make and supply the following base maps of the Borough.
a. An aerial-mosaic map of the Borough, and immediately adjoining area, at a scale of 1 inch equals 300 feet.
b. A line map at the same scale showing all streets, railroads, school grounds and other public properties, and streams and other major existing features or facilities.
2. Compile and tabulate or map the following data for use in making the planning studies and preparing the zoning ordinance and map:
a. Population growth statistics for Mt. Joy and neighboring municipalities, over a period of several decades; same for school population to whatever extent available.
b. Right-of-way and improvement widths of all streets.
c. Boundaries and area of all school and other public properties.
d. Existing use of all land and buildings in the Borough.
e. Financial statistics including: amounts and trends of total assessed valuations over period of years past; present tax rate and trends in tax rate; present Borough indebtedness and trends in indebtedness.
f. Extent of sewer and water service, and general adequacy.
g. Capacity and present occupancy of all schools.
h. Such other similar data as may be found necessary or useful as the work proceeds.
3. Upon basis of above information, field observations, and discussions with the Borough Planning Commission, prepare a general development plan for the Borough and immediately adjoining territory, showing present and proposed streets, school grounds, parks and playgrounds, and other existing and possible future improvements.
4. With benefit of above information and studies, prepare a zoning ordinance and map.
5. Prepare Platting Rules and Regulations for use of Planning Commission in guiding and regulating the subdivision of land.
6. Prepare and deliver an illustrated typewritten report, in triplicate, fully covering the above findings, studies and recommendations.
7. Maps and other materials to be delivered in addition to the typewritten report:
a. The air map.
b. The zoning existing-use map.
c. The general-plan map.
d. The official zoning map on tracing cloth.
e. Typewritten copies of the platting rules and regulations.
f. Typewritten copies of the zoning ordinance.
8. Attend the public hearings on the zoning ordinance, required to be held by the Planning Commission and Burgess and Council.
NOTE: Procedure shall be:
(1). Prepare the above-listed

maps and compile the above-listed data.
(2). Prepare tentative drafts of Borough Plan and Zoning Ordinance and map and present same to the Borough Planning Commission for its consideration, and for discussion until brought into shape satisfactory to the Commission.
(3). Prepare final drafts of plans, maps, and ordinance, in form previously approved by the Planning Commission, and prepare and submit final report.
After the above was discussed at length, Councilmen Myers made a motion that Council pay the Commission \$750 as provided in the budget, provided that some person or persons other than Borough Council pay the remaining \$750. This would give Council the assurance that the Commission would not ask this body to pay the balance next year.
The vote on the above motion was: Messrs. John Moore and Walter Loraw voted against the motion and President, H. H. Krall, Earl Myers and Robert Keller voted yes. Chairman Krall declared the motion carried.
Will Not Accept
In conversation with Mr. Clarence Schock, Chairman of the Commission Tuesday, he stated that Council's proposition will not be accepted because the committee can see no good reason why any individual or any body of men should assume the expense of a permanent improvement in our borough for years to come.
Burgess' Report
Burgess Hendrix reported the collection of \$750 for license fees during March.
Water Committee
Mr. Keller reported the pumping station in the "usual condition". Mr. Schatz wants subsidence cleaned and supervisor began extending water main on Marietta Street.
Property Committee
Mr. Loraw reported having purchased new nets for the tennis courts, new bases for the ball diamond, latch and windows broken and building in park otherwise damaged.
Golfing In Park
Councilman Moore reported that enthusiasts are using the park as a golf driving course, and damaging the lawn as well as taking chances of injuring some one if struck by a golf ball. Also that a property owner adjoining the park has a hat full of golf balls gathered on his lawn.
Pumping Engineer
Mr. Schatz reported having pumped 1,664,000 in 45 hours by Diesel and 4,500,000 by water power in 361 hours, a total of 6,164,000 for March.
Board of Health
Secretary Dillinger reported several cases of mumps quarantined and two nuisances corrected.
Officer Zerphy's Report
Arrests and prosecutions, assault and battery 1; drunk and disorderly 1; solid fuel act 2; stop sign 2.
Objects To Painting
Mr. Frank Walters, E. Main Street, objects to painting the curb yellow at his house because he does not "like the looks of it".

Curbs are being painted thruout the borough to indicate no parking.
Treasurer's Report
Treasurer Nissley reported these balances: Boro, \$6,176.15; Water, \$7,563.15; Interest, old bonds, \$742.
Co. Boro Meeting
Councilman Loraw gave a report of a recent meeting of the County Boro Association and recommended joining the State Association of Boro. Held over until next meeting.
Fining Autoists
Burgess Hendrix stated he did not think it fair to fine a motorist for illegal parking on the first offense. Upon motion Council decided that he, the Burgess shall enforce the ordinance which means it will cost you \$2 if you violate. The Secretary was instructed to get bids on road oil for June 1st delivery.
On Daylight Time
Upon motion, Council decided to do all borough work on daylight saving time beginning April 27.
Ordinance Passed
The ordinance opening Concord Street from Detwiler Avenue south to the alley passed third and final reading and was ordered properly advertised.
These bills were then paid: Boro, \$1,009.96; Water, \$188.25; Strickler Coal Fund, \$26.25; Fatterson Coal Fund, \$15.25.
