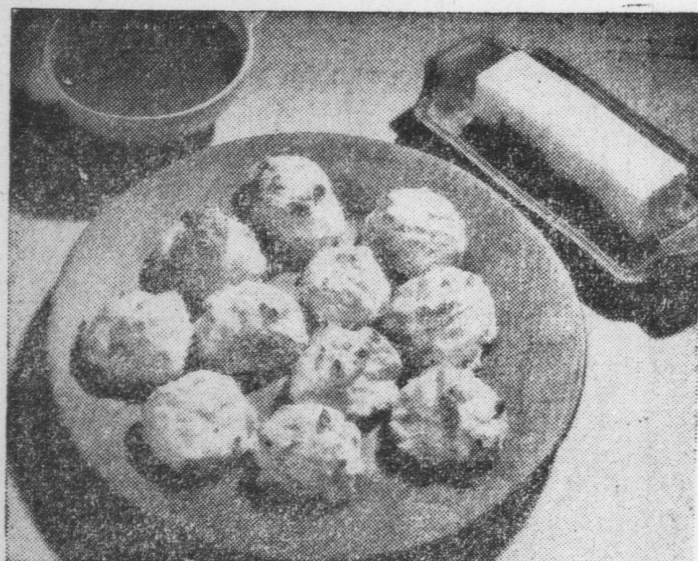

DROP BISCUITS



DROP biscuits are a hot bread short-cut for busy-day meals. Many prefer them to regular biscuits because of their crispness and muffin-like texture.

Lacking time to roll or knead biscuit dough, use slightly more milk than ordinarily required for the batter, stir only until flour is well moistened, and drop by spoonfuls on the baking sheet. The 8 to 10 minutes of baking make brown, crisp hot biscuits in a hurry.

Be sure there is plenty of butter and honey or jam - and plenty of biscuits, too, to bring the family running to breakfast

or to put that special occasion touch into an ordinary dinner.

DROP BISCUITS

- 2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 to 4 tablespoons shortening
1/2 to 1 cup milk

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk and mix until flour is moistened. Drop from spoon on ungreased baking sheet and bake in hot oven (450° F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

Yield: About 18 to 20 biscuits.

(From Page 1) money with which to pay them to appear here and lose a day's work."

Drove a Truck 60 Luther Wilt, Rheems, charged with driving a truck 60 miles an hour in Lycoming county on September 17, 1940 said it was the first time he had driven the truck and after his arrest, a test of the speedometer showed it was running 17 miles slow. He told the inspector he has no way to earn a living without a driver's license.

Wife Testifies J. L. Milligan, Mount Joy, employe of the Shock Independent Oil company, was arrested January 21, 1941 for driving 62 miles per hour between Mount Joy and Harrisburg. He testified that he needs his license to support his wife and three children. Milligan insisted only that he exceeds 50 miles per hour when passing slow moving vehicles. His wife, present in the car at the time of his arrest, testified that she always watches the speedometer when riding in the car and that her husband drove 50 miles per hour and less except when he passed slower moving cars.

Arthur W. Dyer, Manheim, was charged with driving 60 miles per hour between East Petersburg and Manheim. He offered no denial.

Daylight Time

(From page 1) Building will continue to show Standard Time but business will start one hour earlier and the business day will end an hour earlier. Virtually the same procedure will be used by banks. It will be the first time that all of Lancaster County has been on Daylight Saving Time at the start of the "fast time" season.

Lancaster is no longer the "out post" of the Daylight Saving Time belt. Harrisburg and York, long time hold-outs, are now in the Daylight Saving fold. Hershey and other towns adjacent to the county also will be on Daylight Time next week.

Bills have been introduced in Congress seeking national legislation which would make Daylight Time effective throughout the nation as a defense program measure.

'Eternal Hall of Records' Being Hewn in Black Hills An eternal Hall of Records—great chambers hewn out of solid granite, where artifacts of present and future generations will be preserved—is to be part of the development at Mount Rushmore National memorial in the Black hills of South Dakota.

Behind the granite summit on which the faces of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt are being carved in gigantic proportions, is a chasm 150 feet deep. Into the wall of this Gutzon Borglum, sculptor and engineer for the memorial, is blasting a vast tunnel which, when completed, will provide a great subterranean hall with adjoining chambers.

Unlike the crypts in the Egyptian pyramids or the "Time Capsule" at the New York World's fair, it is not the plan to seal this hall, but to maintain therein a continuing record of civilization's rise (or decline). Experts believe that the mammoth cavern, hewn out of solid rock, will endure for thousands of years and that generations ages hence may behold there objects that will seem as ancient to them as Stone age implements appear to Twentieth century man.

Religious Fervor Sam Hines' religious fervor has put him behind bars for another 17 years and 101 days. Hines recently invaded a rural Negro Baptist church near Montgomery, Ala., and took over the pulpit from its rightful occupant at point of a pistol—then launched into a heated sermon. Meantime, the deposed preacher went for the sheriff. Hines was arrested and sentenced to 101 days for use of a deadly weapon. He was fingerprinted and it was discovered he had escaped from Kilby prison here back in 1918 after serving three years of a 20-year term for assault to murder.

Subsequently, Assessor John B. Henry reported to the County Commissioners that residents in Newville and vicinity threatened a "taxpayers' strike" unless some action to abate the situation was taken. Recently the plant installed some apparatus designed to effect a remedy, but residents say little difference was noticed. "The odor can be noticed as far as Elizabethtown," Gish said. "It is objectionable to the whole neighborhood." Fumes are carried toward the shoe company through a railroad cut and several women there were overcome, it was said. B. Frank Shank, president of the school board, will preside at the meeting, Gish said.

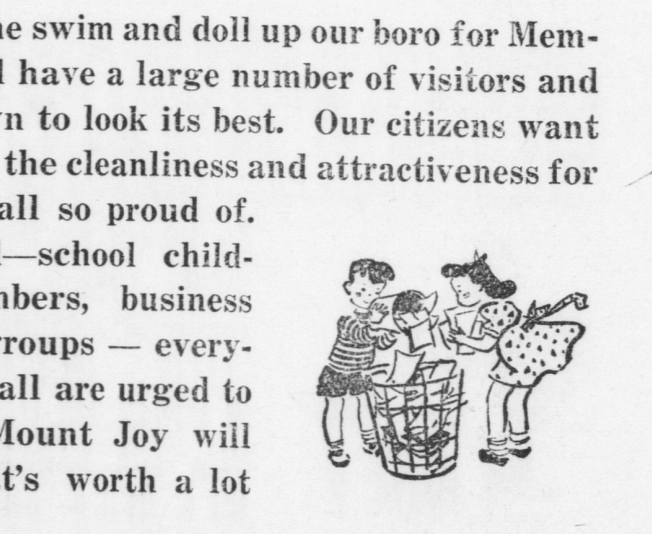
