HOME OWNERS FORUM

WINDOW shades when styled with paint add to interior decorative treatments. Colored or stenciled to blend with mural designs, shades become decorative features rather than drab, blank areas devoid of interest.

Paint for shades must be very thin and form a highly adhesive film, sufficiently elastic as well to prevent cracking when rolled.

Experience has proven that best results are obtained by adding a small amount of good, hard-drying varnish to soft paste white lead which has been reduced with turpentine to an easy flowing mixture. Add colors-in-oil to obtain the tint desired.

Stretch the shade out taut on a level surface before flowing the paint on evenly with a wide, soft brush. The paint must be absolutely dry before the shade is rolled.

Q—Last winter we had trouble thawing frozen pipes. What method do you suggest?

A—Before applying heat to frozen plumbing, shut off the main water supply to prevent flooding should cracks or sprud joints be found due to water expansion upon freezing. Follow by opening adjacent faucets, so the water will flow off freely as the ice melts.

Although the blow torch is the most efficient medium for thawing pipes, some form of electric heat is preferable, as an open flame is a fire hazard even in expert hands. An electric heating appliance held close to the frozen section generally proves effective. Considerable care should be taken that the appliance does not contact the piping.

Apply heat starting at the faucet end and work toward the source of water supply to assure drainage as thawing progresses.

When exposed pipes are adequately insulated, freezing will not occur.
