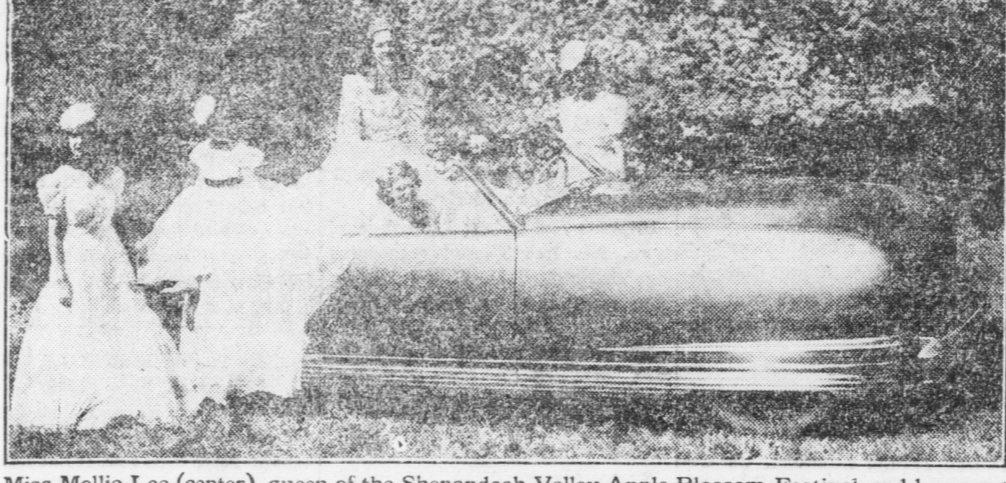

Children's day exercises will be held in the Florin J. B. Church on Sunday, June 8th.



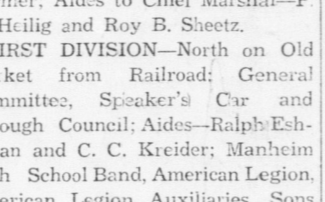

PROCLAMATION
The thirtieth day of May has long been set apart as Memorial Day—a day when every loyal citizen of the United States commemorates deeds of valor, self sacrifice, heroism and love of those brave men and women who have given their lives for their country. A day when a tribute is paid to their memory in song and stirring word; a day when the comrades of those who have gone before journey to the cities of the dead to pay them the respect they merit; a day when we gather the choicest blossoms to adorn the graves of the Nation's heroes. It is fitting that Memorial Day should be kept in this manner. Therefore I call upon every citizen of Mount Joy to join in our part of the Nation's honoring of those honored dead who gave their last bit of devotion to establish justice and equality in a land where it might be free. Furthermore, I call upon you, in these critical days through which we are now passing, days that will determine whether our land will remain free, or fall under the influence of despotic hands. I think seriously of Lincoln's plea at Gettysburg, "That from these honored dead we take increased devotion; that we here resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that the Nation shall under God have a new birth of freedom and that government, of the people, by the people and for the people shall not perish from the earth."
In reverence of the honored dead and in the hope of peace and prosperity for our land I set forth this proclamation.
