### Comes to Rescue With Peroxide for Blondes

AKRON, OHIO.—War or no war, gentlemen there will be no shortage of peroxide blondes.

Until today "blondes" of the factory-made variety had good cause to worry. Production of the necessary peroxide was controlled by Germany.

Recently, however, the B. F. Goodrich company announced discovery of a new treatment to supplant the German-controlled electrolytic process for production of peroxide. The new process employs a compound of coke, limestone and salt, known as kerosol.
