## The 17th Polio Case Is Near Elizabeth'n

Lancaster county's seventeenth case of infantile paralysis was reported Friday, the first since September 24.

The patient is David Dohner, fifteen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Dohner, Elizabethtown R1, who is suffering paralysis on one side of his body.

The boy became ill about a month ago, according to Dr. A. J. Greenleaf, county medical inspector. He was seen twice at an interval of a week by his physician at that time, but showed no symptoms of polio, the medical inspector said. The physician advised him to return if he was not improved, but the boy was not brought to the doctor again until Friday, when his condition grew worse.

## Truck Crash At Salunga; Driver Hurt

James Victoria, thirty, of South River N. J., was admitted to St. Joseph's Hospital in a critical condition with head injuries suffered at 3:30 a. m. Tuesday when a large truck and trailer he was driving sideswiped another truck, snapped off a tree and overturned in Salunga.

The driver of the second truck, Joseph Coffey, 32 escaped uninjured, as his truck ran off the highway and struck a heavy pole which prevented it from overturning.

State Policeman A. Savinsky said that Victoria, who was driving east, apparently fell asleep at the wheel. His truck veered across the highway, sideswiped Coffey's truck headed west, and then ran to the south side of the road where it struck and snapped off a large tree in front of the home of Harry Heistand. The trailer then over turned, scattering shingles and roofing over the highway.

Damage was estimated at \$8,300 by police who say that the truck driven by Victoria valued at \$7,500 was a total loss while damage to the Coffey truck would amount to \$800.
