# For Hunters - and - Fishermen

Although the bulk of the rabbits and pheasants have been killed off there are still some to be had "if you are lucky."

The Lincoln Highway was blocked on the Bridge on the Wrightsville side to Copes diner (about one mile) with automobiles loaded with hunters the first day of the hunting season. Ticket takers at the Bridge estimated that there were about 500 machine loads of gunners that came to Lancaster County to enjoy Pheasant hunting.

Mr. Ralph Farley business manager of the Columbia News reported that there were less trespass signs sold this year than any year since he has been in charge. This goes to show that if the hunters act like gentlemen there will be less posted ground. Most farmers like the Safety Zone signs and they say that all of the hunters feel that they have been granted a privilege when they are left hunt on all the farm land except the Safety Zone area and in quite a few cases the hunters contracted to buy potatoes, turkeys chickens etc. from the farmers on whose ground they went hunting. 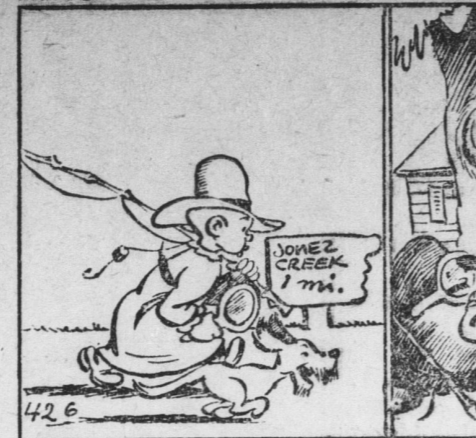
### A Backfire

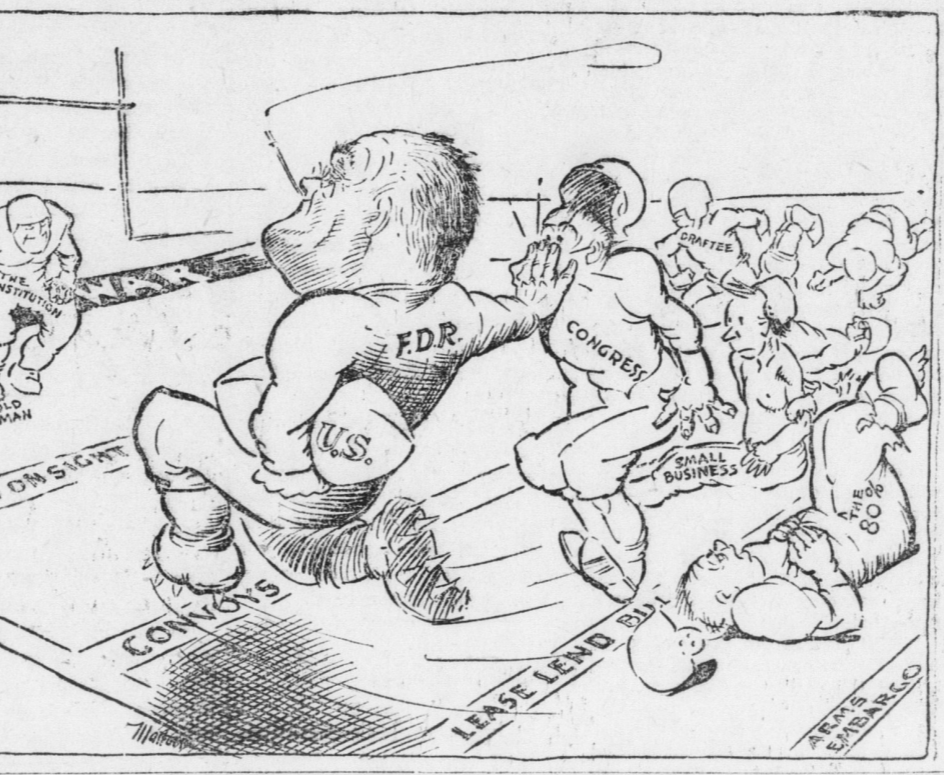
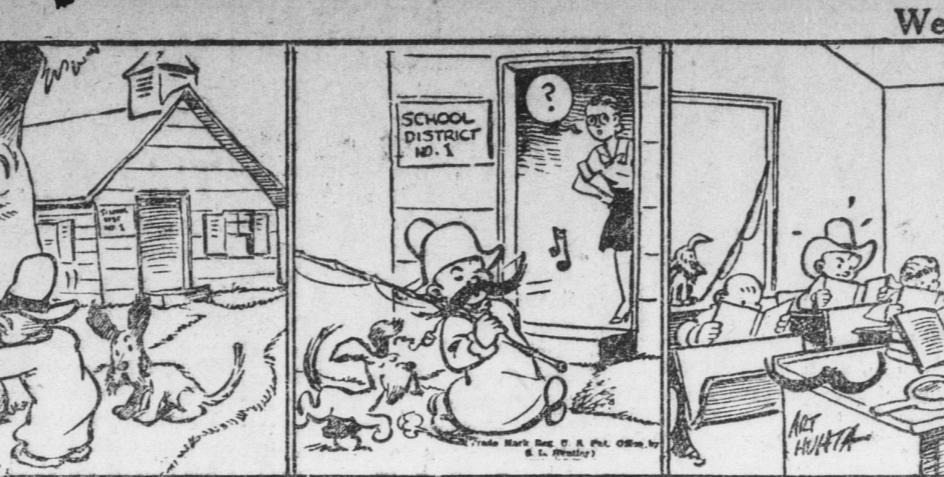
### Aunt Min: "I Jest Got A Hammer An' Nails An' Went To Work"

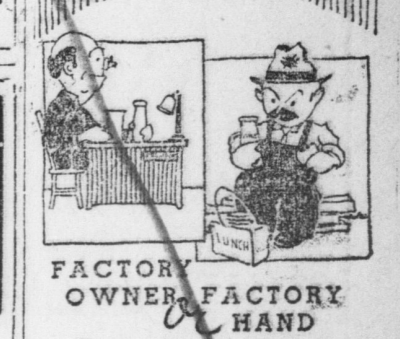
