Change In Opening of Trout Season

Mr. and Mrs. Fisherman there's going to be a slight change in the fishing laws this year relative to the catching of trout.

This year, there will be no need of stumbling around in the dark trying to catch one of those big cannibal trout with live bait at the stroke of midnight, as the new opening hour is 5 A. M.

Some time ago a bill was introduced in the Legislature to prohibit all fishing for one month prior to the opening of the trout season and after much deliberation and discussion they finally compromised on 12 hours; just why is beyond us.

The new regulation prohibits fishing of all kinds from 5 P. M. April 14, to 5 A. M. April 15, when the season officially opens. The size limit remains the same, however, six inches, and the daily creel limit ten, as heretofore.

At the present time, I am going to air craft mechanic school and like it very much, I will graduate on March 10, 1942, after that I don't know what I will be doing, but am trying to get a special course in either, propeller, engine or better than that, I am going to apply for flying sergeant.

The course of air craft is very interesting. It is divided up into 11 courses or pages, each two weeks long, or a total of 22 weeks. The first page is basic, which is everything in general. Then you study structure, which is the construction of planes. Third, is hydraulic which is the different controllable parts, such as landing gear, flaps, doors, 4th, is propeller, which is the study of how they are made and installed and how they are controlled; 5th, instruments, which was a very interesting course we had to learn 30 of the 150, how they work and what their work is. 6th, was the engine, which I liked most of all, so far that is where you get the actual work on the engine, set valves, time the lights and put on new parts. 7th, is ignition, this is what I am studying now, it is the study of all the electrical parts of the plane, such as light, generators, magnets etc. 8th, is combination, which I will study next. 9th is Test blocks, and 10 and 11 is model flight, then the big day comes when we graduate.

There are two shifts of school each day, one goes from 6:00 A. M. to 2 P. M. the other from 2:15 to 10:15 P. M. which I am in. Since the war started we have school six days a week.

Well there goes that old familiar chow call so I will sign off for this time, thanking you very much for the paper each week.
