Flash! Flash! Brief Summary -of- War News

From May 15 to July 15 the Germans lost 900,000 men and the Russians 399,000.

The Reds now have the Hitlerites on the defensive in some sectors of the Voronezh front.

The Navy reports escorting 2400 Merchant vessels across the North Atlantic last winter with a loss of only eight ships.

The Russians said the Germans had lost in two months at least 2900 tanks compared to 940 Red Army tanks; 3000 planes against 1354 Russian planes; up to 200 guns of all calibres against 1905 guns of the Red Army.

July 20 — The Chinese staged a savage comeback against the Japs in the coastal provinces, breaking the invaders' grip on the vital Kiang-si-Chekiang railway by taking Lyang and Hengfeng and the 15-mile stretch of tracks between. They also drove the enemy out of Juian, second important seaport to be recaptured in two days.

July 18—The Russians launched a savage counter-attacks south of Voronezh early today, re-crossed the Don River and annihilation of a Nazi regiment. Two towns were retaken, and the battlefield was left littered with German dead.

July 17—The Japanese have occupied a third island on the tip of the Aleutian chain, our Navy revealed. There were 14 Jap ships sunk or damaged in that area since June 3rd.

London, July 17, Jan Masaryk, Czechoslovakian foreign minister, speaking at an art exhibition at the Czechoslovak institute, today demanded that the United Nations "discard the cricket and Queensbury rules" for the duration and kill as many Germans as possible regardless of race, religion, sex or age.

"Today I'm all for bombing open towns and even killing women and children, to make this terrible war shorter," he said.

July 16—On its first patrol in the Pacific, a United States submarine sank five enemy ships.

In the Voronezh sector the Russians said their troops had captured additional populated points, killed more than 10,000 Nazis in one sector in one week and knocked out several dozen tanks and scores of other vehicles.

American pilots and negro troops have arrived in Ireland, swelling the ranks of the U. S. invasion forces.

July 22— Our war record to date is: 4,801 dead, 3,218 wounded and 36,124 missing.

Our war department made this report: Kiska—Six destroyers, one transport and one cruiser; sunk; one destroyer probably sunk; and four cruisers two destroyers, one aircraft carrier, one gunboat and one transport damaged—18 ships in all.

Thousands Visit Landis Valley's "Dutch" Museum

More than 17,000 visitors have viewed the enormous collection of Pennsylvania "Dutch" material at the Landis Valley Museum, near Lancaster, since it opened in May 1941, the State Department of Commerce reports.

Approximately 200,000 items, collected over a period of years by Henry Kinser Landis, 77, and Geo. Diller Landis, 75, are on display in five new buildings of the old Pennsylvania "Dutch" type. Furniture, farm and household tools, guns, clocks; wagons and carts, Bibles and old books, pottery and glassware, all given evidence of the life of the residents of that historic section from about 1710 to 1900.

Outstanding in the collection are the famous Kentucky rifles, made in Pennsylvania; the Conestoga

wagons which were forerunners of the prairie schooner, and glass products made by "Baron" Henry Stiegel at Manheim.

Newest additions at the Museum include a one-ton wood turning lathe, about 12 feet long and 10 feet high, which came from the Blue Mountain region in northern Berks County. There is also a basket making apparatus and a complete coppersmith's shop and equipment.

This shop operated in Lancaster from just before the Civil War until World War 1.

The Landis Brothers work constantly at repairing and restoring old pieces and consider it part of their job to show interested visitors around explaining the intricacies of early Pennsylvania life.

The Museum is open weekdays from 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. and on Sundays from 1:30 p. m. to 5 p. m., but according to the Brothers, visitors will be shown through outside of regular hours as well.

There is no admission fee.
