Flash! Flash! Brief Summary of War News

Canada has started rationing tea and coffee.

Aug. 2-The first German plane bombed and machine gunned a military installation in Southwest Iceland early Sunday morning.

Aug. 3-The Russians smashed a series of German tank assaults in the Don River bend northwest of Stalingrad early today and reported air squadrons just rushed to the scene had helped slow the Nazi drive in the Kuschchevka-Salsk sectors of the Western Caucasus.

The Reds also reported executing scores of Fifth Columnists in a huge spy ring found operating along the Don.

Aug. 3-Reports of Japanese troop movements up the west coast of Burma were regarded as preparations for an early invasion drive against India. Meanwhile, Mohandas K. Gandhi's call for a mass independence move by all India's peoples was expected to come on Friday.

Aug. 3-The first sinking of a Russian merchant ship by an Axis submarine in American waters, with two women crew members killed by a torpedo, was disclosed as survivors told the attack in the Gulf of Mexico.

Aug. 2-Germans are dropping many spies by parachute behind the Russian lines. The Reds executed 45 of them in one day.

Aug. 4-The Russians early today revealed they had killed 9500 Germans in a successful 24 hour stand on the Don River bend and in the Western Caucasus. The Nazi, however, were only 138 miles from the great Maikon oil fields in their drive in the Salsk and Kuschchevka areas.

Aug. 4-The Japanese were disclosed to have captured Kokoda, tiny New Guinea village, and its jungle airport, just 60 miles by air from the huge Allied base at Port Moresby. Savage patrol battles were raging in the dense jungles at the foot of the high Owen Stanley Mountains, which baricade the route to Port Moresby.

Aug. 4-U. S. fliers again repulsed a heavy Jap plane fleet attempting to gain aerial control over the Allied base at Hengyang, China. It was revealed 119 Jap planes had attacked the city earlier, 17 being shot down.

Aug. 4-The sentences of the eight Nazi saboteurs caught off the Atlantic coast are now up to Pres. Roosevelt. It is hinted penalties may be imposed before they are announced.

The sinking of four more allied vessels in the Atlantic brings the total to 412.

The Reds killed 9,500 Germans in 24 hours in a fight on the Don river elbow, 80 miles northwest of Stalingrad.

Aug. 4-The Navy released its ninth casualty list of the war, announced that dead, wounded and missing men reported to next of kin from the start of the war to July 25 totaled 12,342.

Aug. 4-The Navy revealed a single one of its squadrons had shot down 54 Japanese planes and probably destroyed 18 more in four actions in the Coral Sea and Midway battles, while losing only four itself.

Aug. 4-The Germans have smashed another 50 miles into the Caucasus, driving southwest of Salsk along a railway to Belaya Glna in a flanking move adding a new threat to Tikhoretsk. The Russians admitted early today. Capture of Tikhoretsk would trap the Red Army fighting the Nazis at Kuschchevka.
