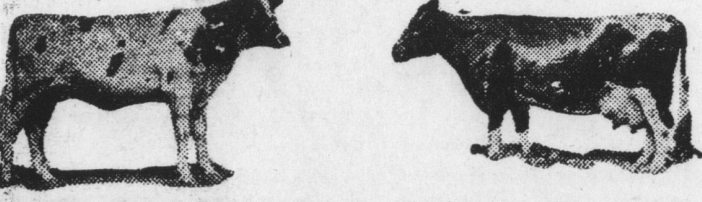

HE TALKS THROUGH HIS THROAT

It looks like Mary Boland's choker. It's really a new type of microphone for the men of the Armored Force. Easier to slip on than his necktie, the new mike snaps about the tank man's throat, leaving his hands free for action on the controls or machine gun button. Two small "mike buttons" press gently against the column of the throat, pick up the tank commander's words directly from vocal cord vibrations, cutting out all extraneous noises, the roar of motors, the chatter of machine guns, and thus eliminating one of the handicaps to intelligibility in combat communications. Microphones like this, as well as rugged tank radios, are coming off Western Electric assembly lines. On the fighting front they will provide the clear communication between armored units so vital to successful mechanized attack.

Many, Many Pumpkins

Mr. Harry Hauenstein, chairman of the vegetable display, said "more pumpkins than we ever had before." The vegetable department was somewhat smaller than last year but the quality of the exhibits was superior to any former show.

In the "Victory Garden" display, consisting of ten or more kinds of vegetables, first ribbon was won by C. Emerson Rohrer, of Manheim; Ray Shelley, Mastersonville, took second place with his garden display; and third ribbon went to the exhibit of Daniel A. Brubaker, Ephrata R1.

Approximately 600 eggs were entered in the show, making it one of the largest and best exhibits of eggs in Lancaster County this season, according to H. S. Sloat, assistant county agent, who judged the display. The classes are modeled after the State Farm Show rules and substantial prizes were offered.

4-H Judging

W. B. Connell, State College livestock specialist, judged all the 4-H Club exhibits of baby beeves, pigs and lambs, and supervised the various showmanship contests held Thursday afternoon. James F. Keim, of State College, and M. M. Smith, assistant county agent, completed the summary club records.

The 18 Chester White pigs sold Friday evening, it was found, made a nearly "perfect" record, their average daily gain being 1.49 pound per pig per day. The lot weighed in at a total of 4,448 pounds, or an average of 247 pounds. All were purchased from s Walter Sword farm, Columbia R2, on May 20, and were fed by the Mount Joy 4-H Pig Club members for a total of 137 days.

The Champion Pig
Ralph Hostetter, Manheim R2, exhibited the champion pig of the show. Rhelda Eshleman, Marietta R1, was second; Kathaleen Hostetter, Manheim R2, was third; and Doris Shuman, Marietta R1, was fourth.
