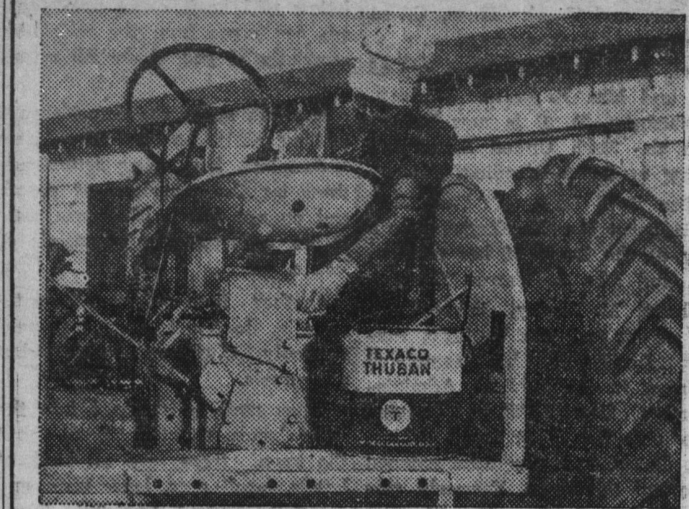
To Get MORE Out Of Your Tractor Know "WHEN TO DO WHAT"

farmers and it now incorporates their suggestions. This table is presented below. I am sure that if farmers follow it as a guide they will save themselves time, money and metal.

AUTHOR'S NOTE: It is not the policy of the N. Y. State Institute of Agriculture to recommend any specific products, and nothing in this article should be so construed.



Be sure and drain, flush and refill the transmission of your tractor twice yearly with a good transmission lubricant.

A PRE-WAR survey by a large farm equipment manufacturer showed a very wide difference in the re-sale values among used tractors of the same year, indicating the dollars and cents results of good and "bad" tractor care. But today, tractor care means more to the farmer than a matter of the dollars invested in his tractor. New tractors will be difficult to buy. And "breakdowns" in the field can mean crop losses, trouble and expense—and "holdups" in the vital program of food production.

The best way that the farmer can insure himself against these losses is to study carefully the manufacturer's instruction manual and to make periodic "check-ups." I have seen recently a "check-up" table which represents the combined recommendations of more than a score of Agricultural Engineers. It was also submitted to a representative group of practical

SPRAY PEACH TREES Where leaf curl attacked peach trees this year it is advisable to spray after the leaves have fallen and when the temperature is above freezing. Plant pathologists of the Pennsylvania State College recom- mend use of lime sulfur, about 5 gallons of the concentrate in 100 gallons of spray.
