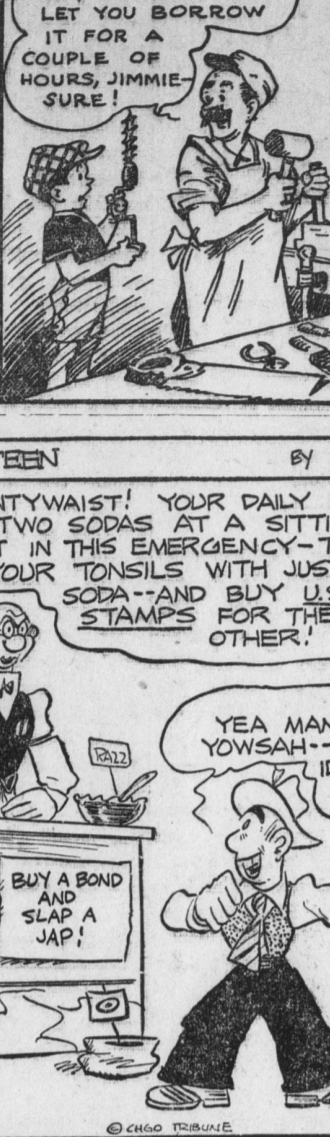

(From page 1) approval of all bills with the exception of the reverse toll call on the Company's phone 186. James Pennell, reporting for the Entertainment Committee, reported the regular monthly proceeds as \$40.18 and the recent smoker profit of \$206.71. Most monies were turned over to the Financial Secretary. A motion was made and carried that the smoker proceeds should be deposited in the bank and be known as the "Service Men's Fund" for dues and assessments for these members. Robert Kunkle, reporting for the Trustees, reported that to date no first aid kits had been purchased for the truck, suggesting that first aid kits should be made up instead of purchasing already made kits. He also reported the death of Amos Myers, informing the Company that the investigation to whom the death benefits should be paid has not been made to date but would be made in the very near future. Earl Zink, reporting for the Custodians, reported 56 uniforms now at the cleaner and requested that all remaining suits which are still out be returned as soon as possible. Charles Eshleman reported that there were two buyers for the old pool table within the last ten days. No sale has yet been made. Chief Myers reported receiving \$10.00 from Don, W. Gorrecht for services recently rendered. The \$10.00 will be deposited into the engine fund. A motion was made and carried that the company purchase a \$500 bond for the assistance of the Tuberculosis Drive. This bond is to be paid from the General Fund. Another motion was made and carried that the Company should authorize the Financial Secretary to write a \$200.00 death benefit check of Amos Myers to whomever the Trustees designate. The Secretary read a letter from Mrs. Amos Myers and daughter, Gale Anne, in appreciation for our thoughtfulness during her recent bereavement. Levi Dillinger moved and Earl Zink seconded that since there was only competition in one office for election of officers for 1943 that the Secretary should cast a ballot for all officers where no competition exists for 1943. The motion carried. The results of the election of Trustees for one year were as follows: Clayton Newcomer, 27 votes; Richard D'vit, 12 votes. 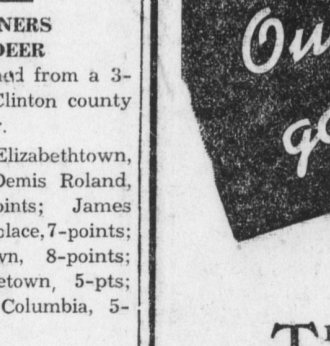

Starch Gives Fine Body To Washed Neckwear

As quaint as the daguerreotypes in which they first made their appearance many years ago, are the rippily jabots and fichus which the spring 1942 styles have brought back into fashion. No suit or dress seems complete without its frothy bit of snowy neckwear fastened by a piece of antique jewelry or one of the bright-stoned, modern pins. Lace alone, or in combination with organdie and other dainty fabrics, is used for the neckwear. Two or three wearings are all these little wisps can take without intermediate washing. They are too fragile for rough handling, but they can be laundered beautifully if a delicate touch is applied. Let them soak for about ten minutes in warm, but not hot, soapy water. This will loosen the soil. Transfer the jabot to a pan of fresh lukewarm suds and press it up and down, or put it into a covered jar filled with lukewarm suds and shake the jar like a cocktail shaker. Rinse in clear water. Unless the fabric has a permanent starch finish, dip it into a weak starch solution. Ease the jabot back into its rippily form and let it dry to an even dampness. Iron on the wrong side. A toy iron or a small traveling iron gets into the gathers more readily than the standard-sized iron, but the larger iron can turn out a nice job, too, with a little care. Diceys, bibs, and other straight pieces are plain sailing, of course, but don't shy away from the frills just because they are a little more trouble. They have so much extra glamour value that they are worth the little added care it takes to get them back into condition.
