CIVIC IMPROVEMENT

The borough of Mount Joy is one of the best situated towns in this area. One of the main lines of the Pennsylvania Railroad runs through the center of the community connecting Philadelphia with Harrisburg, the capital of the Keystone state. It also is located along an important highway connecting these two cities, with Lancaster just twelve miles east of it. The citizens of this community should therefore justify improvements which make a bigger and better community.

There have been many good improvements made in the past years. An addition to our High School is one of the best examples. Street markers have been established at the corners of most all of the important streets. We also have set aside a certain space for the community park.
