The Black Market In Gas Stamps Blocked; 20 Are Accused

A black market in gasoline, which operated on ration coupons taken from the Mount Joy rationing office, was broken up Thursday with the filing of charges against 20 persons-six of them from Lancaster County-the Harrisburg district OPA office announced.

George Kunkel, chief enforcement attorney at the district office said that 3,000 "T" and "C" gasoline coupons, having a value of 15,-000 gallons, were involved.

The twenty men, 19 of whom are civilians employed at the Middletown Air Depot, were charged with accepting and transferring ration coupons in violation of regulations before U. C. Commissioner W. S. Middleton, of Harrisburg.

Philadelphia's vast refineries were linked with the oil fields of Texas when the final section of the fabulous "Big Inch" world's largest pipeline-was welded into place Monday afternoon at Phoenixville Already test runs are driving crude oil eastward through the 24inch pipeline at the rate of 33 and 1-3 miles a day and in about three weeks the "Inch" will be delivering the invaluable crude direct to the refineries of Philadelphia and Delaware county.

When ration stamps stray from coupon books and begin changing ands like currency, it spells trouble Loose stamps mean somebody gets nore than his share of rationed foods, offsetting allocation plans and breeding black marketeering," declares Guy J. Swope, District OPA Director in the weekly OPA New Letter issued by the Harrisburg District Office.

The District OPA official advanced the above observation in commenting upon a recent survey indicating that the 271/2 million adults and children living in farm homes have 66 per cent unneeded red (meat and fats) stamps.
