County Draft Board No. 1 Classifies

Code to classifications: P, pending physical examination; Class 1-A—available for military service; Class 1-A-1—available for limited military service; Class 1-A-2—conscientious objector available for noncombatant military service; Class 1-C—member of the land or naval forces of the U. S.; Class 2-A—man necessary in his essential civilian activity; Class 2-B—man necessary to the war production program; Class 2-C—man deferred by reason of his agricultural occupation or endeavor; Class 3-A—man with child or children deferred by reason of maintaining bona fide family relationship; Class 3-C—man with dependents who is regularly engaged in agricultural occupation or endeavor; Class 3-D—man deferred because cause induction would cause extreme hardship and privation to a wife, child, or parent with whom he maintains a bona fide family relationship; Class 4-A—man 45 years old, or older, who is deferred by reason of age; Class 4-B—official deferred by law; Class 4-C—neutral aliens requesting relief from liability for training and the armed forces; Class 4-D—minister of religion or divinity students; Class 4-E—conscientious objector available for work of national importance; Class 4-F—physically, mentally, or morally unfit. Letter (H) behind classification indicates man now deferred because his age group is not being accepted for military service.

Year 1941, \$397.77; for 1940, \$168.45. Burgess Hendrix reported having collected \$18.00 during September.

Mr. Newcomer of the Street committee, reported a portion of New, Barbara and Jacob streets oiled.

Mr. Keller of the Water committee, reported electric connections made by the Penna. Power & Light Co. and motors working fine.

Supervisor Smeltzer reported he is in need of several curb stops, roofs on all boro sheds repainted and needed white paint for painting parking and crossing markers. He was instructed to purchase the latter.

Pumping engineer Schatz reported having pumped 6,745,000 gallons of water during September.

Fire Chief Myers reported three grass patch fires during the month and that he was informed by the Civilian Defense committee at Washington that we will receive 400 feet of 2 1/2 in. fire hose gratis.

Secretary Dillinger of the Board of Health reported no quarantine or nuisances last month.

Officer Zerphy reported these prosecutions: Drunk and disorderly 1, Speed law violations 4, Reckless driving 2, Parking tickets 3.

Mr. Charles Eshleman complained about the unsightly condition of several of the Penna. Railroad Company's houses on West Donegal street and that the owners should be compelled to improve them in accordance with other properties in that section.

This matter was referred to the solicitor to take whatever action he sees fit.

The report of H. N. Nissly, treasurer, follows: Balances: Boro account, \$7,557.89; Water, \$1,900.64; fire house bonds, \$5.72; Patterson coal fund, \$176.82; Strickler coal fund, \$116.38.

Upon motion the property owners on both sides of Lumber street from the railroad bridge to West Donegal street will be asked to relay the sidewalks.

The electric light ordinance authorizing Council to renew the electric street lighting contract with the Penna. Power & Light Co. for a period of five years, was passed and ordered advertised.

The Supervisor was instructed to repaint the crossings and traffic lines wherever necessary thruout the boro.

Upon motion it was decided to have a representative of the L. B. Smith Co. at Harrisburg come here and give an estimate on putting the Diesel engine in first class shape.

\$1,000 was ordered transferred from the boro to the Water account, \$800 and interest was ordered paid on the Diesel engine indebtedness and \$500 on the fire house debt.

Burgess Hendrix made inquiry as to what he should do relative to the many complaints about riding bicycles on sidewalks. President Lora had the ordinance read covering same, passed in 1895 when the late H. L. Stager was burgess. Upon motion this ordinance was repealed and the Solicitor will be instructed to prepare a new and more modern one.

A number of pedestrians have been struck by bicyclists recently while riding on the sidewalks, hence this legislation against the practice.

All bills were paid and Council adjourned.
