House Passes Bill To Grant Vets \$300

Battering down a long string of amendments designed to give additional benefits to veterans, the House yesterday approved its own Military Affairs Committee's bill granting mustering-out pay to persons in the armed forces.

The measure, passed by a vote of 387 to 0, would give \$100 to persons in active service for less than 60 days and \$300 to those who have served 60 days or more. One-third of the money would be paid upon discharge from the service and the remainder in two equal installments 30 and 60 days after the initial payment.
