MEETING HERE MONDAY OF INTEREST TO FARMERS

During the past two years some relatively new insect pests have attacked us on the home front in food production. Last year, European corn borer increased from 100 to 300 percent in this county. Checks showed from 94% to 98% of the corn stalks infested with from one to eighteen borers per stalk. They also several damaged early staked tomatoes and potatoes. Japanese beetles have moved to the western part of the county in larger numbers and they are hard on pollination of the ears of corn.

J. O. Pepper and Robert Copper, Insect and corn Extension Specialists from State College, will discuss corn insects, hybrid corns, and soil fertility, illustrated by pictures in color.
