Rotary Club Inspects Florin Foundry Plant

With the meeting of the Rotary Club Tuesday at Hostetter's, a new note was injected into the meeting, when the Rotarians journeyed to the Florin Foundry for a tour of that manufacturing plant.

The first part of the meeting at Hostetter's, President Paul Stoner, stated that the Steelton Rotary Club, the newest club to be organized in this district, will receive their charter on Tuesday evening, and that all who wish to attend that meeting from this club, were to advise Secretary Walter Sloan, President Stoner also gave a few of the highlights that will take place at the Rotary Conference, which will be held in Harrisburg, April 30, and May 1, and H. G. Carpenter, chairman of the "On To Harrisburg" committee, will, if at all possible, have something further on the plans for this conference, at the next meeting.

In order to obtain a cog for the Rotary Wheel, the club must visit two places of business of club members, and Tuesday the Rotarians journeyed to Florin, for it's first such visit. This tour was made possible through the cooperation of Myrtle Sellers, a Rotarian, and manager of the Florin Foundry. Upon arriving at the plant the Rotarians were taken on a tour of the plant, during which the various operations in the manufacturing of stoves and castings were explained. The tour ended about 1:30, and the group split up into small parties, each party looking at the thing or things that most interested them, until about 1:55, when the groups assembled to watch the molten iron being poured. To the majority, this was not a new experience, but to some it was the first time they witnessed the "pouring" as it is called. About 2:15 the members left to return to their respective businesses.

In the near future the members will visit some other place of business, and then a cog will be received, which will help to complete the Rotary wheel, containing twenty-four of the cogs. At it's completion it will be presented to President Paul Stoner.
