HALF RATE FEES FOR AUTO TAGS EFFECTIVE OCT. 1

Beginning October 1, half-rate fees for motor vehicle licenses go into effect in Pennsylvania, the Lancaster Automobile Club advises. These continue until January 1st, when fees are reduced to one-fourth the annual rate for the remainder of the license year, which ends March 31. The reduced rates apply to all motor vehicle registrations, but not to fees for titles, operator licenses or learner permits, which remain the same throughout the year.

1,500 Children Are Serving On Patrols. Again This School Term

Hospital Ship Patients Write In Praise Of Excellent Care Given

Letters written by patients who have returned to the United States from the fighting fronts aboard Army hospital ships show the sincere gratitude these sick and wounded men feel for their treatment during the ocean voyage, the War Department reported today. Some of these letters, usually addressed to the senior medical officer aboard ship, or to the master, are written in painfully careful style of men unused to speak their gratitude. Others are composed fluently. All of them show that these casualties feel they are practically "home" when they board a hospital ship, despite the long voyage that lies ahead. The change from front-line privation to clean beds, familiar music, and foods that had been only memories, make them feel the America they are fighting for. After the voyage, they are "more than ever anxious and willing to carry on in the great struggle our country still faces." (Turn to Page 5)
