Classified as an on-the-line trainee, he is now engaged in administrative work at the AAF Training Command field to learn organization and operation procedures of an Army Air Forces installation. He will be transferred to air crew training, officers said, when an opening is announced.

Panama City, Fla. Pvt. Robert C. Bergman has been graduated from the Army Air Forces Flexible Gunnery School at Tyndall Field, one of the largest schools of its kind in the Army Air Forces Training Command.
Upon his graduation, the soldier received a pair of silver wings signifying that now he is ready to take his place as a member of the combat crew of an AAF bomber.
At the gunnery school, he was trained in the operation of .30 and .50 calibre machine guns, first on ground ranges and later in the air, learning by simulated aerial battle conditions how to blast enemy fighter planes from the sky.
As an aerial gunner he will join thousands of his "teammates of the sky," carrying the attack to the enemy in all parts of the world as guardians of America's heavy and medium bombers.

I am going to send him my Bulletin as he has not received his or any other mail for 30 days.
