5,285 Rotary Clubs with a membership of 235,500 Rotarians. Just about twenty years ago Rotary came to Mount Joy, starting with a few members under the guidance of its first president J. A. Bachman. For a program suitable and befitting the celebrating of the 40th anniversary of the founding of Rotary, "Past Presidents' Day" was observed at the regular Tuesday meeting of the club here. Nineteen presidents have served since the beginning of the club. The first to serve was J. A. Bachman, who served in 1926-27; 1927-28, Dr. A. F. Snyder; 1928-29, Clyde Gerberich; 1929-30, Harry Newcomer; 1930-31, John Booth; 1931-32, H. Carpenter; 1932-33, Dr. O. G. Longenecker; 1933-34, Clyde Eshleman; 1934-35, Rev. George Kercher; 1935-36, Wm. Nitrauer; 1936-37, Grant Gerberich; 1937-38, Dr. W. R. Heilig; 1938-39, Christ Walters; 1939-40, Ralph Eshleman; 1940-41, Simon Nissley; 1941-42, John Greiner; 1942-43, Clarence Newcomer; 1943-44, Paul Stoner; 1944-45, Rev. Lester Koder.

The program opened with a half minute of silent prayer for the past presidents who have passed on as follows: Dr. A. F. Snyder, H. S. Newcomer, Dr. O. G. Longenecker, and Rev. George Kercher. Following this the program chairman, Dr. Shoop, called on the past presidents present to give a few remarks. The first to speak was the club's first president, J. A. Bachman, who said he saw the club in its infancy and has watched it grow through these years, and that he is proud to be a member.

Next was John Booth, who was president during the depression year, when the club dropped to twenty
