## NEWS about those IN THE SERVICE

### Captured in Africa

Cpl. James S. Beamerderfer, 33, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Beamerderfer, Mount Joy, a prisoner since February, 1943, was liberated from a German prison camp, according to word received by his parents from the War Department through the Red Cross.

Cpl. Beamerderfer was attached to headquarters detachment of an infantry regiment. He entered the service May 18, 1941 and went overseas in March, 1942. He was captured in North Africa.

### Joined Marine Guard

Marine Pfc. Joseph E. McLaughlin, whose wife resides at 62 West Main St., this boro has joined the Marine Guard at the Naval Air Station at Jacksonville, Fla., following 28 months of "Jap and Jungle" fighting in the South Pacific.

A veteran member of the First Marine Division, serving with the outfit during his overseas tours, Leatherneck McLaughlin participated in the Guadalcanal, Cape Gloucester and Peleliu campaigns. He was attached to the special weapons section of the First Division.

For his three Pacific operations, the twenty-five-year-old Marine wears the First Marine Division Presidential citation, the Pacific ribbon with four stars and his Purple Heart. He was wounded by Jap mortar shrapnel on Bloody Ridge, Peleliu.

Pfc. McLaughlin entered the Corps on August, 1938. He attended Mt. Joy High School where he won various letters in soccer.

### Now A Major

Recently promoted to Major, Charles O. Brandt son of Mrs. Estella Brandt, of Mount Joy, Pa. is a member of the European Division, Air Transport Command, United States Army Air Forces, commanded by Brigadier General Earl S. Hoag. He is now serving at ATC's Paris Airport which is the most important air transportation terminus in Europe.

As the trans-Atlantic aerial supply line between the United States and Europe, ATC's European Division operates hundred of cargo and passenger planes monthly. Among its assignment are the air evacuation of American wounded to the United States, the flying of whole blood and blood plasma from the

United States to Europe, carrying high priority passengers and cargo and many tons of soldiers' mail. A graduate of Mercersburg Academy, Major Brandt owned and operated a Flying School at the Detroit City Airport before entering the Army in May 1942. At present he is an Operation Officer at this base. His wife, Mrs. Evelyn G. Brandt, resides at 749 1/2 Lake St., Reno, Nevada.

Three combat casualties, including a soldier killed in Germany five days before the Nazis surrender, were reported Monday as other Lancaster county soldiers were listed as liberated from prison camps.

Pfc. Jay Dyer, twenty-one, a member of a Tank Destroyer battalion, was killed in action in Germany, May 3, the War Department notified his sister, Dorothy Dyer, of Elizabethtown.

The soldier was a son of Harry Dyer, Florin, and has been reared by Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Shoop, of Falmouth. He was employed on the Shoop farm prior to entering the service.

He was inducted in February, 1943, and trained at Camp Hood, Tex., and Camp Shenango, Pa., before going overseas in February, 1943. He was a graduate of Bainbridge High school.

Besides his father and sister, he leaves a brother, Harry, serving with the Army Air Forces overseas.

### Hears Son Was Freed

Staff Sgt. Kenneth W. Wolgemuth, twenty, captured February 24, 1944, when the plane on which he was flight engineer was shot down has been liberated from a German prison camp, Aaron Wolgemuth, Florin, was notified by the Red Cross.

Sgt. Wolgemuth, who was on his sixth bombing raid when shot down, is now in England, according to the message. He entered the service September 13, 1940 and went overseas in December, 1943.

### FO Piersol Liberated

Flight Officer James Piersol, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Piersol, of Mount Joy, was liberated from a prisoner of war camp in Germany and is in good health, according to a cablegram received by his parents from him.

He was serving as a bombardier on a B-17 and was on his tenth mission when he was reported missing in action over Regensburg, Germany, on Dec. 28. He was later reported held prisoner at Camp Barth, along the Baltic. In a letter

from him, he stated that he has been slightly wounded in action when he was captured.

### East Donegal Sailor Lost Life Off Jap Coast

An East Donegal youth was among the hundreds of Navy men who lost their lives March 19 when Jap bombing planes made a shambles of the U. S. Aircraft Carrier Franklin, just off the coast of Japan, it was revealed Thursday.

He was Christian Goss Shireman, Jr., seaman second class, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Christian G. Shireman, Marietta Rd, who made his home with an uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. George C. Rhoads, Bainbridge.

Mr. and Mrs. Rhoads closely guarded the identity of the ship on which their nephew was killed until the Navy Department released the epic story of the flat-top.

They were notified of the death of the eighteen-year-old sailor early in April and the Navy Department said that he was buried at sea with full military honors.

He entered the Navy in October, 1944 and received his training at the Great Lakes, Ill., Naval Training Station. He left Dec. 26, 1944 for California and shortly afterwards sailed for combat duty in the South Pacific.

Seaman Shireman was graduated in the spring of 1944 from the Hershey Industrial School.

### Lt. Bender Reported Freed From Nazis

Lt. Samuel H. Bender, a prisoner of the Germans since November, 1943, has been liberated by U. S. troops, the Red Cross notified his wife, Mrs. Jane Bender, of Landisville.

The message received yesterday was the first word Mrs. Bender had concerning her husband since November, 1944, when she learned he was held at Stalag 1.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Bender, also of Landisville, he entered the service in July, 1941.
