Brief News Of The Day From Local Dailies

President Truman has designated June 14 as flag day. There are 78,336 persons registered to vote in Lancaster county. Did you know that there are 30,000 crippled children in Pennsylvania. 11 were killed and 52 injured by an explosion at the Edgewood Arsenal in Maryland. Two employees of the Lancaster County National Bank have been reported for shortage totalling \$15,000. When a tire on a truck blew out at Lancaster, it hurled a portion of the rubber thru a plate glass window. Abe Cohen, retail furniture dealer at Ephrata, was fined \$11,680.59 unpaid income tax for the past 34 years. The H. J. Heinz Co., Pittsburgh, food processors, may locate a big plant in the old fair grounds at Lancaster. The barn on the Daniel M. Witmer farm, near Safe Harbor, was destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$20,000. The Government has cancelled orders for 17,000 aircraft that had been planned for manufacture in the next 18 months. War Production chairman, J. A. Krug, says there are today 800,000 idle men in the United States and that there will be 1,900,000 within three months. While a circus enroute from Lancaster to Lebanon, was passing thru Manheim, two large trucks got stuck on its streets. Several circus elephants were used to pull the trucks out of the mire.
