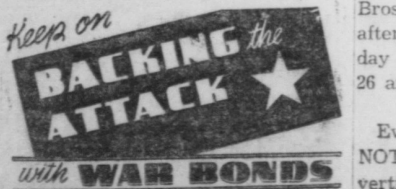
Our Dumb Dora is so dumb that when her date called her "a regular Venus," because she wasn't all there, she was flattered.

MENNONITE CHILDREN'S HOME ELECTED ITS OFFICERS

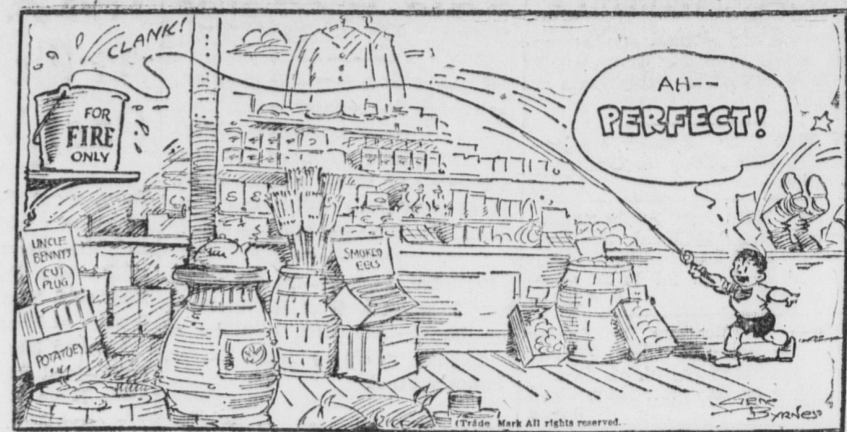
