Summer Flareups of Sleeping Sickness

A special report to the Bulletin from Harrisburg follows:
With the season for late summer flareups of sleeping sickness now here, health authorities today reported that chicken mites have just been added to the list of carriers of this killing disease of horses. The virus of sleeping sickness was isolated from chicken mites on a farm where horses had come down with sleeping sickness, the American Foundation for Animal Health reported.

"It is believed that the mites pick up the virus from chickens, and in turn transmit the disease to people as well as to horses," the report said. "Veterinarians had previously found that the virus could be harbored from year to year by birds and poultry, and then passed on by mosquitoes, ticks, and the assassin bug. Mites are now added to this list of 'vectors'."

"In view of the late summer and early fall flareups of sleeping sickness in the past several years, farmers should take every step possible to protect their animals now against such outbreaks. Vaccination is recommended in those areas where the disease has appeared before. Efforts should be made to eliminate biting insects from stables, to keep horses and mules out of lowland pastures, and to protect them with nets while at work."

NON-METALLIC CABLE

AVERTS LIGHTNING HAZARD
Non-metallic electric cable should be used for all farm wiring, especially in barns and other tall buildings to avert the hazard of lightning, according to the Agricultural Extension Service. Armored cable or wires in conduit, constitute a hazard around the farm.

Some farmers who are installing barn hay finishers (mow driers) as a means of eliminating spontaneous combustion are permitting electricians to connect motors with armored cable and wires in metal conduit. This introduces a hazard from lightning, the Service points out. In addition to averting possible short circuits from lightning bolts, non-metallic electric cable also is far more durable in damp locations such as stables and storage cellars, it is said.

HANDLE WITH CARE

Because DDT is a poison, it should be handled carefully, says J. O. Pepper, extension entomologist of the Pennsylvania State College. When applying DDT in any form, all feed or food should be covered. Until more information is available, he reminds, DDT should be handled with the same precautions given any poison.
