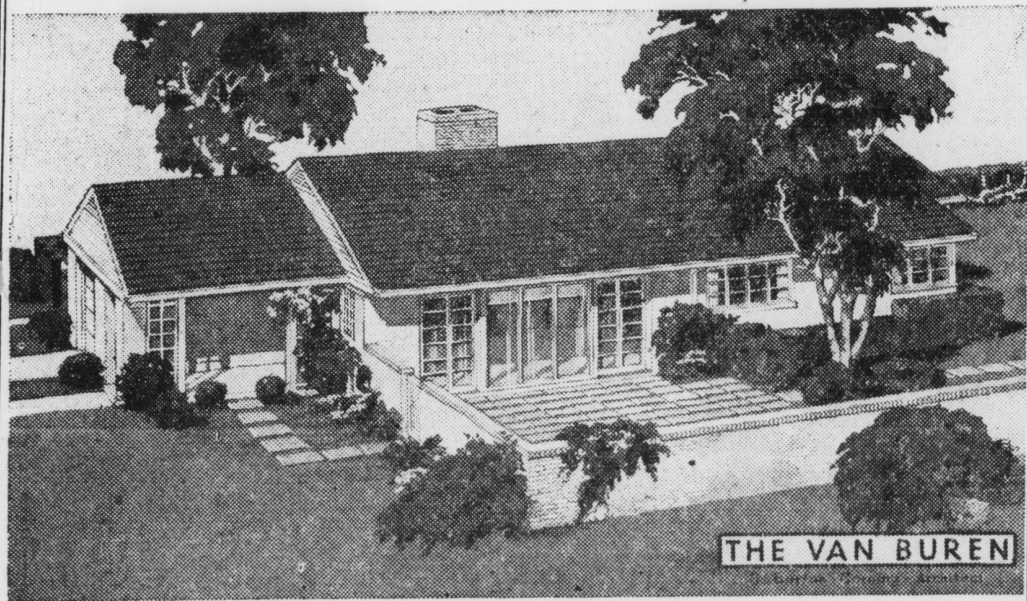

onica, Greece. Here the boys had a week shore leave, during which they saw many of the ruins of Greece. They report that the people are very much in need, and the schools are very poor, as they have only what the Germans did not destroy during the invasion. The boys feel that Americans cannot appreciate their fine schools, unless they could see the deplorable condition of those in this war torn country they have visited.

They next anchored at Pervans the harbor of Athens. The people there are quite respectful to the Americans. While there, two of the crew had to be left in the hospital and Luke Bomberger and one of the other cattlemen signed up to do the work of the ill crewmen on the return trip.

From Pervans they sailed to Naples, Italy and took on 102 returning troops. They next anchored at Beni Saf in North Africa to pick up ballast.

Facilities are not very good on a freight ship, the boys reported, but the soldiers do not mind because the ship is taking them home.

The S. S. Charles W. Wooster anchored at Newport News, Virginia, on October 11.

Evenings. A number of nights a week he assists Daniel Derr in unloading coal trucked here from the mines. In addition Fackler opens sewers, cesspools etc. on his spare time and last but not least he attends to several furnace fires every morning and evening. One of them is at the Washington Hotel.

It is the assertion of the average person who knows that Mr. Fackler earns from \$15 to \$20 weekly in addition to his regular salary.

In addition the Facklers' oldest daughter works at Geo. Brown's Sons Mill here and averages \$50 to \$60 every two weeks or \$25 to \$30 per week. She lives at home.

Better still, several of the other children carry papers daily for the Kulp News Agency here, earning several dollars too.

By the above facts it may be seen that approximately \$80 or more is paid this family regularly every week and there is absolutely no occasion for the family to be "in

marked poverty", as various reports broadcast.

We would welcome a suggestion which would remedy existing conditions.

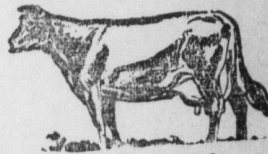

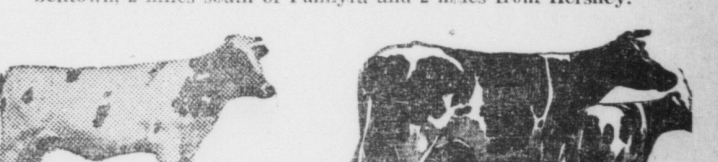
