with the natives, as they supply alot of the labor used on the island. We are a gasoline supply unit which also handle all other kinds of petroleum products. We receive it in 55 gal. drums and stack them in orderly piles. The natives do most of the handling with the help of the mechanical cranes and we drivers do the handling and delivering of the supplies wherever needed.

It is quite a bit of work for the natives as they are very small people and not too husky but they do a good job. I am glad that I had a chance to work with them as it gives a person a good chance to see what other peoples of this world are really like.

Well, I guess I have said about everything that I know at this time and I am looking forward to the day when I can return to Mt. Joy again, which I believe will be sometime in the Spring.

Oh yes, I almost forgot to mention that I have met another boy here from Mt. Joy. His name is McClellan but I neglected to learn his first name, I'm sorry to say, but I do know he used to work as an usher at the Joy Theatre at one time. We had a long talk about good old Mt. Joy and other things of interest. We are separated again and probably won't see each other again until we return home.

I also met a boy from Manheim by the name of Wade Hamaker. It was about 10 years since I last saw him and we hardly recognized each other but we soon struck up old acquaintanceship. We used to go to school together about 16 years ago.

Well, I guess that is about all, so I will say so long until the time I can visit you in person and thank you for everything. May I take this opportunity to say "hello" to all my swell friends in Mount Joy.
