District Governor Phil Deane will be present. The other announcement was for a directors meeting to be held next Tuesday evening in the Richland Club rooms, beginning at 7:30. All chairmen of the various committees are asked to be present at this meeting.

The speaker for the day was Arthur Hackman, principal of East Hempfield Township schools at Landisville, who spoke on the subject, "Is Permanent World Peace a Possibility". Finding a solution to this problem, said Mr. Hackman, I asked several persons in various walks of life, what they thought concerning this question. The first asked was a physician friend of his, who said in his reply, "They ought to Kill all the Japs." The next person asked was a minister friend who said, "they ought to teach them about the brotherhood of man. The third person asked was a store keeper who said, "let them all starve". Then, said Mr. Hackman, I began looking for an answer to this problem, somewhere in the history of the world, and the first place I went to was the Bible, where I found my answer. It was found in the story of the Good Samaritan, where the four philosophies of mankind are found.

The first of the philosophies was the one of the robber. What is yours is mine if I can get it. He then went down through history and told of the various men who had this same idea, and even today when a world peace is being shaped, that idea still prevails, and said Mr. Hackman, world peace is not possible, if that philosophy is used.

The second philosophy, that of the Priest and the Levite was, What is mine is mine and I am going to keep it. In the world today, said Mr. Hackman, this philosophy is predominant, and permanent world peace cannot be a possibility, if there is no sacrifice.

The third philosophy, that of the Inn keeper, which was, what is mine is yours if you can pay for it. Here Mr. Hackman gave a very good example of the philosophy as it was used in our modern times. A fee of \$5.00 was charged for each American soldier that passed through the Suez canal, and this money of course went to Britain, but said Mr. Hackman, no fee was charged for any British soldier that passed through the Panama canal, because we were both fighting for the same ideal. There can be no permanent peace with this philosophy working in the world today.

The fourth and final philosophy, that of the Good Samaritan, which was, what I have is yours if I only take the opportunity to share it. This and only this philosophy, said Prof. Hackman is the answer to the question, "Is a Permanent World a Possibility". The question we should ask ourselves, Do laws make for peace, or do men make for peace? The answer cannot be found in laws, it must be in the hearts of the men who are at the head of the organizations for peace. We must build better world on the fourth philosophy, not on any one of the other three.

Th's talk was enjoyed by every one there, for in it contained an abundance of food for thought.
