Move To Create Water System For Salunga And Landisville Soon

Plans for a water supply system in East Hempfield Twp., postponed in 1941 due to the war, may be realized before the end of this year, it was announced Tuesday night. The announcement was made in connection with an advertisement from the Municipal Authority of East Hempfield Twp. to receive contractors' bids for the installation of the system.

The Municipal Authority was authorized in 1941 by the township supervisors and received a charter from the state the same year. Members of the authority are Jesse Snavey, J. Miller Eshleman, Paul S. Baker, E. M. Godshalk, and Norman L. Bowers.

A spokesman for the authority said Tuesday night the source of water for the proposed system which will service Landisville and Salunga and the surrounding vicinity, is a spring located about three quarters of a mile south of the Landisville camp-meeting grounds along the Oyster Point road.

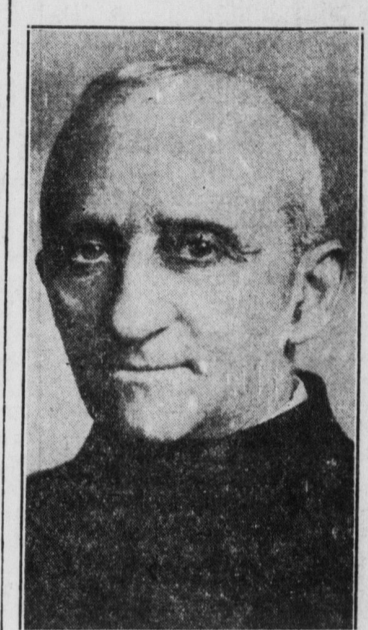
