Three Are Injured In Automobile Collisions

David Shelly, thirty, Mt. Joy R2, was admitted under observation to St. Joseph's Hospital suffering injuries received when an automobile he was driving crashed into a pole on Route 230, north of E-town shortly before midnight Sunday.

Attendants at the hospital said Shelly suffered chest injuries, contusions of the right knee and abrasions of the right hand. His condition is not regarded as serious.

Shelly told attendants that he was driving east on the Harrisburg Pike when he suddenly came upon a slow moving automobile and as he swerved to avoid a collision, his automobile skidded into a pole.

Two persons were slightly injured at 11:30 a. m. Sunday when two autos collided on a township road, north of Ironville, State Police at the Columbia sub-station reported.

Private George Baxter, who is investigating, said the injured were Dora M. Grumbling, forty-seven, Mt. Joy R2, and Anna M. Heisey, 3, same address. Both suffered slight lacerations of the forehead and were treated at the scene. They were passengers in an auto operated by Edward Grumbling, 50, Mt. Joy R2.

The Grumbling auto, the officer said, was traveling north on the road and attempted to pass an auto operated by Charles M. Schaeffer, Florin, also traveling north. As he passed, Baxter reported, he cut in sharply in front of Schaeffer's auto and a collision occurred. Schaeffer's auto upset, he added.

BARN SAVED BUT 300 CHICKS PERISH IN FIRE

Prompt work on the part of Elizabethtown and Rheems firemen saved a barn on the John Jones property near E-town, about 7:20 p. m. Monday, when a defective brooder stove located on the second floor of the combination barn and garage burst into flames.

There were 300 three-day old chicks, a considerable quantity of furniture stored on the second floor of the barn and two tons of baled hay burned, at a loss estimated by Paul Shiffer, E-town fire chief, at \$500.

About 30 firemen pumped water 600 feet from a stream, using the portable pumper.

Sewage & Disposition Aired at Public Meeting

About one hundred citizens of the boro attended a public meeting in the high school auditorium last evening to hear the advantages and disadvantages of a proposed sewage system here before voting for or against same at the Spring election.

The speakers' platform held Borough solicitor Wm. Arnold Esq., Mr. Robt. Lowry, representative of the Capital Engineering Co., of Dillsburg; Burgess Thomas J. B. Brown, President of Council Walter G. Lowry, and the following councilmen: Messrs. Clayton Newcomer, Harold Krall, Jay G. Eicherly and Dr. W. L. Shoop. Also secretary of council Maurice Bailey.

Mr. Lowry explained in detail the sewage disposal system known as the Lewis process and his company's method of financing same.

Should the voters designate their desire in favor of a sewage system Borough Council would make a thorough investigation of all available types of plants and then decide on the most economical financing method.

Most sewage disposal systems are of the bacteria type. That is, the (Turn to page 4)
