## Turkey Eggs

Turkey eggs may one day sell as chicken eggs sell today, and be used for cooking in both homes and restaurants. Some of the small-type turkeys developed by the department of agriculture are much heavier than the average large turkey. As more of these small turkeys are raised, growers may have surplus eggs that could be marketed. Because these smaller turkeys require less feed than larger turkeys they are more economical egg producers. Heavy-laying, even smaller turkeys could be developed if there should be a demand for them. There is little difference in the two kinds of eggs. They taste the same, and the whites and yolks are the same in color. Weight for weight, they have about equal nutritive value. The yolk of a turkey egg is slightly firmer so holds its shape well in poaching. At present most turkey eggs are needed for hatching. One of the small-type turkeys laid 211 eggs last year, and another 206 in contrast to the 40 to 60 eggs a year laid by the average turkey.

Game Commission. Applicants should be over the age of 21 years and their background should be that of a sportsman the Protector stated. Haversstick also said that ex-servicemen with cars would be given preference, and he added that although Deputy Game Protectors usually serve without pay there are times in the fall and winter when they are paid when given special assignments by the salaried Protector in the District.

The Game Official further added that interested persons should write to him at once for a formal Application Blank at his headquarters located at 741 College Ave., Lancaster, in order to qualify for the written examinations next month. He concluded by saying that he is especially interested in hearing from persons in the western, northern and eastern parts of the county.
