U. S. Navy Recruiting

The U. S. Navy Department has an announcement that all restrictions have been lifted on ratings for enlistments in its huge post-war Naval Reserve. According to Chief Frank E. Papuga, recruiter in charge of the local Recruiting Office, men who are or who were in the Regular Navy, through enlistment or induction, or men who were in the Naval Reserve, may be enlisted or reenlisted in Class V-6 U. S. Naval Reserve for inactive duty regardless of the length of time that has elapsed since the date of discharge. He further stated that they can be enlisted or reenlisted in the rate held at the time of their discharge.

The age limit for those men who wish to enlist in the inactive Naval Reserve is 17-35 inclusive. Those men above the upper age limit will be eligible if previous Regular Naval service or active Naval Reserve Service, deducted from present age, place them in the foregoing age group. Applications for enlistment or reenlistment in the USNR for inactive duty of men in a higher age bracket than that specified above, who have had active duty in the U. S. Navy or U. S. Naval Reserve during World War II, may be submitted for decision provided the age of such applicant does not exceed the 50½ years.

Men who desire to enlist in the inactive Naval Reserve may apply at the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station Lancaster, Penna.
