The four-day Lancaster County Industrial Exhibit is now being planned jointly by the Foreman's Club of Lancaster and the Lancaster Manufacturers' Association, with Justus S. Gray chairman and Daniel Rhoads, Co-chairman of the coordinating committee.

"Industry on Parade" is designed to show the general public the di-

versity and volume of mechanical equipment, machinery, home materials, clothing and numerous other articles turned out by large and small plants in the city and county. Displays will illustrate local industry's major role in the war effort, as well as the part it is enacting in conversion to peacetime living.

LOANS TO FARMERS FOR GRAIN NOW AVAILABLE
Loans for fall grain and feed are now available to farmers, it has been announced by Field Supervisor V. J. Denlinger of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Office (U. S. Department of Agriculture) in Lancaster.

Applications are being accepted for crop and feed loans in amounts up to \$400. The interest rate is 4% a year, and loans made at this season of the year will mature Aug. 31st of next year.

An increased seeding of wheat and other grains for 1947 harvest is anticipated.

Farmers in this county who desire more information or who wish to apply for a crop or feed loan should write to Field Supervisor V. J. Denlinger, P. O. Box 3, Lancaster, Pa., or call at the office, Room 418, Beneman Building, 53 North Duke Street, Lancaster. Supv. Denlinger will arrange also to call at farms to take applications for loans, if notified.
