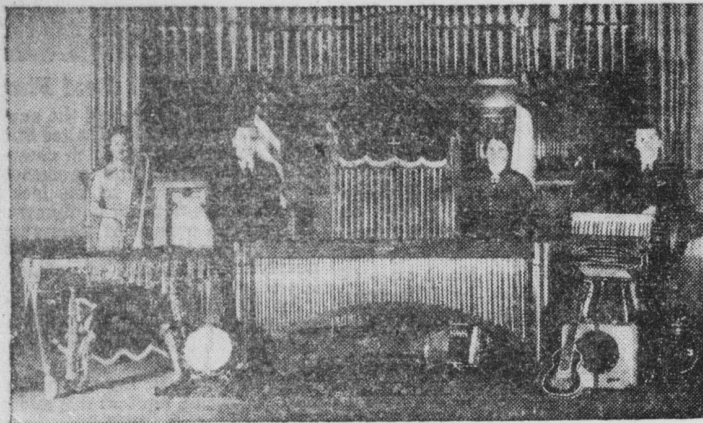


# Rally Day in the United Brethren Church—Musical Slacks Coming

## Physicians Remove Shell Fragment From Heart

Two doctors in the army medical corps report the successful removal of a shell fragment from the heart of a 23-year-old American soldier, in an article in the Archives of Surgery magazine. Lt. Col. William B. Schaefer and Capt. Victor P. Satsinsky say the soldier was wounded June 24, 1944, near Cherbourg, France, when a mortar fragment "strung him through his back." X-ray films failed to reveal the shell fragment because of the collection of blood in the chest cavity.

The foreign body was located, however, by fluoroscopic examination which revealed that the object moved with the beat of the heart. Surgical exploration showed the fragment had cut through the lung and penetrated the heart. A small incision was made in the left chamber of the heart and the fragment was grasped and removed by clamps. The patient was given oxygen, sulfadiazine and penicillin.

The authors state that "six weeks following operation, the patient was permitted out of bed and graduated exercises were begun. Special exercises were instituted early to assist in the re-expansion of the lung (which was collapsed), to prevent deformity and to aid in the development of the thoracic (chest) cage. These exercises were carried out regularly four times daily. . . . Four months after operation, the patient was in excellent condition."

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## Holy Land Has World's Famous Battlegrounds

Turbulent Palestine, Holy Land in the Near East, has been torn by international and inner conflict for millenniums of history. The land which stretches southeastward from the blue waters of the Mediterranean contains some of the world's oldest and most famous battlegrounds.

It saw the early struggles of the Canaanites, the Israelites, and the Philistines. It felt the invading forces of the Pharaohs, of Alexander the Great, the Saracens, the Crusaders, and Napoleon. With its open coastal approaches, its easy mountain passes, and the north-south channel of the Jordan valley, Palestine was an inevitable traffic lane between the expanding civilizations of the ancient Nile and the Euphrates. The fertile Esdraelon plain, framed by hills and linking the maritime plain of Sharon with desert routes leading north and northeast, was a natural arena. The first historic battle occurred nearly 1,500 years before Christ at the Megiddo gateway to Esdraelon. There Thothmes III of Egypt defeated Syrian troops in a struggle which was a preview of those to follow.

## Panama Stamps

The President of Panama has authorized the issue of 1,000,000 postage stamps commemorating the meeting of Panama's second national constitutional assembly. The engravings on these stamps are of particular interest to philatelists. All of the stamps have the word "Panama" across the top and the words "Asamblea Nacional Constituyente—1945" across the bottom. The coat of arms of the Republic of Panama as adopted by the constitution of 1904 will appear on the 50-cent denomination. The entire shield rests upon a field of green symbolizing vegetation. On one section of the upper part a spade and a hoe appear, crossed to symbolize labor. One of the sections of the lower part of the shield shows on a field of blue a cornucopia, emblem of plenty. The other section shows on a field of silver the winged wheel, symbol of progress.

## New British Bastion

With Great Britain's decision to withdraw troops from Egypt, the island of Cyprus "moves in" as a northern British outpost of the Suez canal. Often since antiquity, Cyprus has served armies guarding or invading the Syrian coast 60 miles east or the Asia Minor coast 50 miles north. In the past decade its strategic relation to Port Said and the Near East prompted the British decision to make the island an eastern counterpart of Malta, near the center of the Mediterranean, and rugged Gibraltar at the western gateway. After leasing the island from Turkey from 1878 to 1914, Great Britain annexed Cyprus in World War I and gave it colonial status in 1925. Nearly 400,000 people — Greek Christians and Turkish Mohammedans — make Cyprus a crowded patchwork of villages.

## Slack Scalding

All locker birds should be slack scalded instead of hard scalded, extensionists say. Hard scalded birds often turn rancid if held for a while. To slack scald the birds they should be killed by cutting the jugular vein and sticking the brain. The birds should then be dipped up and down for one minute in water that is 125 to 128 degrees for broilers and 128 to 130 degrees for old hens. A large enough dipping vat or bucket should be used so the bird will not lower the temperature too much during the minute it is in the water. After picking the feathers the body heat should be removed before putting it in the locker.

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
