Twenty-one ladies attended the organization meeting of the V. F. W. Auxiliary, last Friday evening at the Fire Hall.

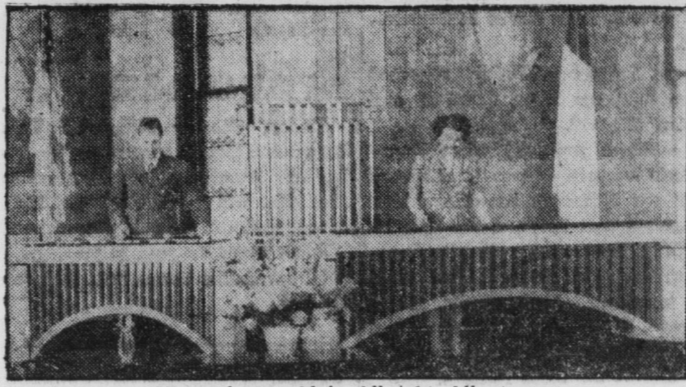
