SPORTSMEN REPORT PROFIT OF \$438 FROM BOOTH

A total of 1600 black bass, ranging in size from three to four inches, have been stocked in the Big Chickies Creek, from White Oak dam to the Susquehanna River, it was announced by the Fish Committee of the Mount Joy Sportsmen's Club at the monthly meeting of the club this week.

Also reported during the business session were plans to place refuge signs around the preserve cared for by the club. The chairman of the Forest and Stream Committee was instructed to secure information from the State Game Commission pertaining to the feeding and habits of Quail.

Paul Diffenderfer, reporting for the Community Show Committee announced a net profit of \$448.98 had been realized from the club booth and of this sum \$400 was ordered placed in the building fund and the remainder in the trap fund. A total of \$300, proceeds from trap shooting was also ordered into the trap fund.

A shooting match for turkeys and geese will be held on Sunday, October 20th, at 1:00 p. m., on the Mt. Joy Sportsmen's trap field north of Florin.
