**Pa. Power & Light  
Electrification Makes  
Substantial Progress**

Mr. J. M. Huebner, Pennsylvania Power & Light Company local Vice President, announced today that PP&L had constructed 1,052 miles of new rural electric service lines to date this year. "This is substantial progress," said the power company official, "toward the company's goal of making electric service available to every farm and rural home in the company service area." PP&L's service areas includes 9,200 square miles in all or parts of 28 counties in central eastern Pennsylvania. These new rural electric lines bring service to 5,000 additional customers of which 2-3 are farm customers. In the same period another 2,000 customers have been added on lines built prior to 1945. The significant fact, the Vice President pointed out, is that the new service provides electric hired hands to a very large number of farmers at a most opportune time for increasing production is still required of American agriculture, even though available farm labor is still drastically short. "The war has been a convincing demonstration to the American farmer that electricity can provide for agriculture the same speed and mass production method it has provided all other American industry," said Mr. Huebner. It is recognized today that there are more than 121 uses for electricity in farm production and work and about 90 more in the farm home. The new lines give the company a total of over 11,630 miles of rural electric lines which, according to Mr. Huebner, would, if extended in a straight line, reach across the United States and the Pacific Ocean and well into northern China. The company now serves over 36,000 farm customers, or an average of seven out of every ten farms in its territory, which is well above the national average of four out of every ten farms. Construction of additional rural electric service lines, was stated by Mr. Huebner, is going ahead as additional equipment and construction materials become available. At present there is an unprecedented shortage of materials, even more critical than during many of the war years.
