Petition Seeking Relocation For Highway No. 441

More than 800 Columbians have already signed a petition which is now being circulated in both Columbia and Marietta, asking for the re-location of the Columbia-Marietta Road, highway No. 441 because of driving conditions on the road.

The Marietta Council has already approved the move, and the petition is being widely circulated in both communities. No house-to-house canvass is being made, but the petition is available for signing at many public places.

The petition states that the highway between the boroughs is in bad condition, that it has steep grades and dangerous curves and that winter driving on it is extremely dangerous.

The proposed re-location would eliminate the road around the base of Chickies Rock and bring the route into Columbia at Second or Third Sts. In addition to eliminating all danger points on the road, the plan would reduce the distance between the two towns.

Road engineers have agreed that patching the road would be of little help in its present condition and that only a complete rebuilding would eliminate the ruts which now give motorists the well-known "wash-board" effect.

Mt. Joy Schools Get \$958.20 For Vocat'l Purposes

Auditor General G. Harold Wagner today approved payments totaling \$22,029.91 to eleven school districts in Lancaster County. The money represents the annual distribution out of a \$2,000,000 appropriation set aside by the 1945 Legislature for vocational education purposes.

The districts, and the amount each will receive, are:

East Cocalico Township, \$1,612.30; East Donegal Township, \$2,076.75; Elizabethtown Boro, \$640; Lancaster City, \$7,375.88; Litzitz Boro, \$488.60; Manheim Boro, \$1,822.60; Manheim Township, \$648; Manor Township-Millersville Boro Joint Board, \$2,089.50; Mount Joy Boro, \$958.20; Quarryville Boro, \$2,366.66; West Lampeter Township, \$1,991.42.

LANDISVILLE CONTRACTOR GETS BRIDGE CONTRACT

J. Richard Nissley, Landisville, has been awarded a contract by the Department of Highways for construction of 23 of a mile of macadam approaches and an I-beam bridge over Little Conowingo Creek in Fulton Township, Lancaster County. Nissley will do the work at his low bid of \$30,071.92.

Bids for the project were received November 1. It will be financed entirely with State funds.

A detour 3.5 miles over improved roads will be placed in effect during construction. This detour will be over U. S. Route 222 and traffic Route 272.

The new bridge will carry Rural Route 3692 over the stream. The grade of the approaches will be raised to improve sight distance. Minor changes will be made in the stream channel to protect the highway.

Property of Ross Ulrich will be affected by the improvement.

The section will be graded for a width of 24 feet. The pavement will consist of an eight inch base and 2 1/2 inch surface, 14 feet wide.

Four Young Men On Trip To Greece

Messrs. Henry Eli Reist, Mount Joy RI; Henry F. Brubaker, Mount Joy RI; Elmer S. Randler, Florin; and Clyde E. Wivell, Mount Joy RI, sailed from Newport News, Virginia for Greece on the S. S. Dudley H. Thomas on November 8, 1946. Five thousand nautical cowboys have been recruited from all the states in the Union as well as Canada. Their duties on board ship consist of feeding, watering, and otherwise caring for the 200,000 animals being shipped this year.

The qualification desirable for this position are the ability to handle animals and the desire to personally do something in a positive constructive way to aid the world situation. Men of good moral and ethical ideals who will be a tribute to their country and the program of which they are a part will be welcomed and respected by the people of Europe.

Since June 1945, approximately 185 trips have been made transporting horses, mules, and cattle to Greece, Yugoslavia, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Italy. The Brethren Service Committee at New Windsor, Maryland recruits the cowboys to care for these animals which are supplied by UNRRA.

They're combining a useful service to needy people along with a very informative trip for which they will be paid \$150 and maintenance while on ship. The trips usually last from 4 to 6 weeks.
