### Select Cows Continue

To Increase Production

Cows in dairy herd improvement associations set a new high in average production in 1945, according to the Bureau of Dairy Industry as announced by the department of agriculture. The 1945 averages were 8,592 pounds of milk and 346 pounds of butterfat to the cow. These compare with 8,296 pounds of milk and 336 pounds of butterfat for 1944. Twenty years ago the average production was less than 7,500 pounds of milk and 290 of butterfat.

The bureau says that aside from planning and personal attention, the rising level of production reflects the culling of low producers from herds; feeding the remaining cows according to their capacity to produce; and the continuing selection of the best animals for breeding

At the start of 1945 there were 949 active associations and 777 reported results to the bureau. Pennsylvania, New York, California and Michigan were the states with the largest numbers of active associations. For the nation the average value of product sold per cow in the associations was \$302 and the average feed cost was \$128, leaving \$174 as the average difference to cover labor, investment and other costs. Eight states reported margins of more than \$200 per cow in difference between feed cost and value of product. The small states, Delaware, Connecticut and Rhode Island showed the highest average margins, with New York fourth. During the year the number of active associations increased by 175 to a total of 1,124 on January 1, 1946.


