TAX ORDINANCE AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF MOUNT JOY, COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, FIXING THE TAX RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 1947.

BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED and it is hereby ordained and enacted by the Council of the Borough of Mount Joy, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

SECTION 1: That a tax be and the same is hereby levied on all property and occupations within the said Borough subject to taxation for Borough purposes for the fiscal year 1947 as follows:

Tax rate for general Borough purposes, the sum of (10) mills on each dollar of assessed valuation;

For other purposes as follows: \$5.00 per person on each person in the Borough 21 years of age and over. Making a total tax rate for all Borough purposes of Ten (10) Mills.

SECTION 2: That any ordinance, or part of ordinance, conflicting with this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed insofar as the same affects this ordinance.

Spiritual Retreat

An all-day Spiritual Retreat will be held on Ash Wednesday, February 19, in Covenant Evangelical U. B. Church, West Orange and Mulberry Streets, Lancaster, for the two East Pennsylvania Conferences of the denomination. In view of the recently consummated union of the former Church of the United Brethren in Christ and the former Evangelical Church, this will be a historic event. An excellent program has been provided by the committees for this event.

Messages will be delivered during the day by Bishops J. Balmer Showers and John S. Stamm, of Harrisburg, presiding bishops of the two conferences joining in the retreat. Other speakers will be Rev. 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Cherry Tree Research Results are explained. Results of extensive research on ringspot and yellows, two virus diseases affecting cherry orchards of southern Pennsylvania, were reported to the State Horticultural meeting at the State Farm Show last week by F. H. Lewis.

He told of the long-time projects conducted at the fruit research laboratory of the Pennsylvania Agricultural Experiment Station at Arendtsville.

Careful selection and planting of parent trees for budwood sources ten years ago have resulted in between 50,000 and 75,000 cherry trees being propagated from these selected parents in the past two years, the scientist reported. He revealed that while these trees may not be completely free of the virus diseases, definite progress has been made toward elimination of this hazard, through the new program.
