place, accepted a position with the Manheim Electric Co., who had the street lighting contract in Mount Joy. His duties were to turn the street lights on and off by hand, make ordinary repairs and replace all burned out bulbs. For his services he was paid the enormous (?)

sum of five dollars per month. Sept. 1, 1911 the Edison Electric Company consumed the Manheim Electric Co., and Mr. Miller continued in their employ but was promoted. Thereafter he was meter reader and trouble shooter at a slight increase in salary. January 1, 1931 the Pennsylvania Power and Light Company succeeded the Edison Co. at which time Mr. Miller was again promoted, this time to District Manager, which included Mount Joy, Elizabethtown and the surrounding territory. This position he filled very capably until Monday, March 17, when he was retired. His retirement date was April 1 but he was entitled to a two weeks vacation. Mr. Miller has been a faithful employee and we were given to understand that the management regrets losing his services. Sam tells us he will take a much needed rest, with frequent indulgence in fishing and as soon as he tires of that he'll start "pickin'" around at something in the electric line. May he enjoy his retirement for many years.
