## Banker For 55 Yrs. Will Retire Oct. 1st

Harry N. Nissly has resigned as cashier of the Union National Mt.

Joy Bank to take effect on October 1, 1947.  
Mr. Nissly was born one-half mile east of Maytown in East Donegal Township, Lancaster County, Penna. He was educated at the Union and Rock Point Schools, E. Donegal High School and Millersville State Teachers College. He taught school at the Breneman School for one term and the Joint School for two terms.  
In 1895 he was elected teller at the Union National Mount Joy Bank, after he had served as a clerk during the summers of 1892, 1893, and 1894.  
In 1905 he was elected assistant cashier, a position which he held for five years. In 1910 he became cashier. He has been cashier for thirty-seven years and was connected with the bank for over fifty-five years. During this period, (Turn to Page 2)

## ARTIFICIAL BREEDING IS PROVING VALUABLE

About eight out of ten young cows produced through the service of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Artificial Breeding Cooperative at Landisville, this county, are exceeding their dams in milk and butterfat production.  
Initial records have been obtained from tests in dairy herd improvement association work and the results are considered the "most conclusive proof yet provided as to the real worth of artificial breeding," according to County Agent F. S. Bucher.  
The 8-10 improvement ratio compares very favorably, he maintains, with similar records for natural breeding in which less than half the daughters have been as good as or better than their dams.  
Many of the young cows from artificial breeding have been producing 400 to 500 pounds of fat in 305 days on twice-a-day milking.

## 172 RECEIVE INJECTIONS AT BAINBRIDGE SCHOOL

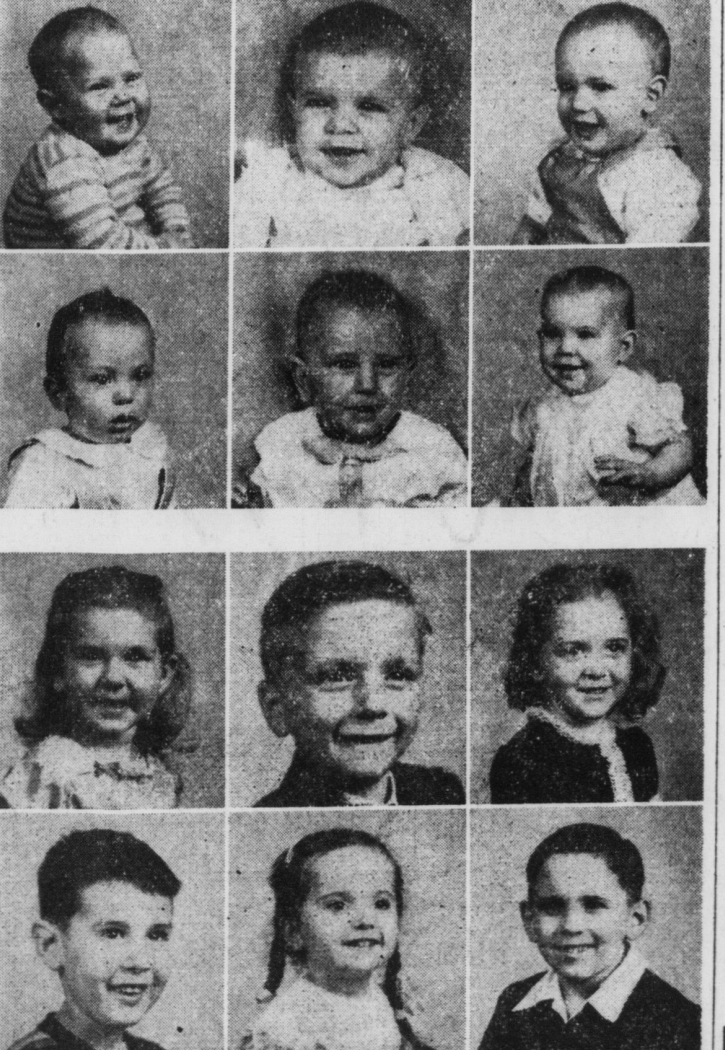
