About eight out of ten young cows produced through the service of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Artificial Breeding Cooperative at Landisville, this county, are exceeding their dams in milk and

butterfat production. Initial records have been obtained from tests in dairy herd improvement association work and the results are considered the 'most conclusive proof yet provided as to the real worth of artificial breeding," according to

County Agent F. S. Bucher. The 8-10 improvement ratio compares very favorably, he maintains, with similar records for natural breeding in which less than half the daughters have been as good as or better than their dams. Many of the young cows from artificial breeding have been producing 400 to 500 pounds of fat in

305 days on twice-a-day milking.
