TO APPEAR THIS YEAR No 17-year locusts are scheduled to appear in Pennsylvania this year, according to Dr. A. B. Champlain, principal entomologist in the

Department of Agriculture Nine of the 30 different boods or hatches of the periodical cicada are known to exist in this State, each brood appearing in a different year, but reappearing in its own locality every 17 years. Brood I showed up in a few southern Pennsylvania counties in 1943.
