Anti-Saloon League Speaker In Mount Joy

On Sunday evening at 7:30 p.m. George W. Lefis of Philadelphia will speak in Trinity Evangelical Congregational Church, Mt. Joy. Rev. Lewis is a representative of the Philadelphia District of the Pennsylvania Anti-Saloon League. Reasons for voting dry will be stressed in hundreds of churches Sunday which are located in the 48 counties where local option elections have been called. In Lancaster County the dries have called elections in the borough of Millersville, and the townships of Leacock, East Lampeter, Paradise, Martie, Manor, Conestoga, and Colerain. The wets have sponsored elections in West Lampeter and Providence townships. August 17th has been chosen because it is Temperance Sunday and the theme is "To Drink or Not To Drink." The dries and wets are well organized for this combat in the Keystone State which threatens this year to be a genuine and perhaps decisive tug of war. According to the Liquor Control Board 223 elections were called in 48 counties. While a few are on the question of beer only and some others are on the question of liquor only some 170 voting areas will settle the question of "Beer and Liquor." Wets are making the claim that local option is prohibition, which they say was a "disgrace and a failure and must not come back." The dries are fighting for "better, cleaner and more Christian communities." One of the dry slogans is, "You can't find a right way to do a wrong thing." The Pastor L. Dallas Ziegler invites the public to attend this important service.

State Game Laws For This Season

Sportsmen of Pennsylvania may hit the trail 9 a.m., November 1, for a month-long season of small game hunting, according to an announcement by the Game Commission. Grouse hunting has been restricted to the first week of the small game season with bag limits set at two a day or six for the season. Following the 12-day buck season which opens December 1, a State-wide antlerless deer season is permitted for one day only on December 13. Bag limits for each hunter were set at one deer, antlered or antlerless or six for each camp. The Commission urged hunters to confine their antlerless deer hunting to farming areas and adjacent woodlands to give landowners much needed relief from deer depredations. Bear hunters will have six days beginning November 17 to bag the limit of one bruin. Snowshoe rabbits may be hunted from December 22 to January 1, but the Commission explained that hares are not too numerous. After the first day of hunting season, shooting hours during the remainder of the year will be from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.
