Repairing the Highway Salunga To Elizab't'n

A process known as "sealing the sub-grade" will be started by the local division of the State Department of Highways on two sections of the Harrisburg Pike between Salunga and Elizabethtown, it was stated Friday by H. L. Worst, Jr., Lancaster County maintenance superintendent.

Worst said his crews expected to start work this week to pump an asphalt mixture through holes drilled in the cement highway. Pumped in at high temperatures, the mixture hardens and will fill a void created under the roadway by heavy truck traffic, Worst explained.

The two stretches to be repaired are on the three-lane highway between Salunga and Mount Joy and between Florin and Elizabethtown. Each section is about two miles long, Worst said.

A pneumatic drill was used all this week to drill holes in the center of the concrete on the north lane in the portion of roadway to be repaired between Salunga and Mount Joy. Holes are drilled about six feet apart to permit the insertion of the pump nozzles carrying the sealing mixture.

Nearly 9,000 State Farm Show Prizes

Nearly 9,000 prizes — largest total in history — will be offered at the 1948 State Farm Show next January 12-16, the Farm Show Commission announced.

Cash awards amounting to \$44,569, the Commission said, will range from \$10.423 to exhibitors of dairy cattle, to \$65 to the winners of a statewide horseshoe pitching contest.

Other departmental premium totals include horses, \$3,450; sheep, \$3,272; swine, \$2,785; beef cattle, \$6,018; dairy products, \$202; corn, \$538; small grains, \$282; potatoes, \$502; tobacco, \$290; apples, \$1,739; edible nuts, \$65 vegetables, \$556; 50; ample products, \$185; apiary products, \$638.50; wool, \$190; eggs, \$58; poultry, \$8,650; dressed turkeys, \$88; baby chicks, \$126; vocational demonstrations, \$600; vocational school exhibits, \$590; horse pulling contest, \$500.

Mt. Joy Boro Gets \$594 For Road Work

Included in the \$1,646,760.33 approved by Auditor General G. Harold Wagner for street, road and bridge construction, repair and maintenance in Pennsylvania cities, boroughs, first and second class townships is \$594.25 for Mt. Joy boro.

Use of the funds by local governments is limited to street, road and bridge construction, repair and maintenance. Allocations are made on a road mileage basis. The political subdivisions are required to submit semi-annual reports showing the work that has been completed under the provisions of the act, and the cost thereof.

Payments to be received by Lancaster County's boroughs follow: Columbia, \$1,356.98; Elizabethtown, \$655.44; Ephrata, \$1,156.66; Millersville, \$359.57; Mt. Joy, \$594.25; Mountville, \$215.41; Washington Boro, \$152.55.

Townships: East Donegal, \$971.83; East Hempfield, \$990.54; Rapho, \$1,800.94; West Hempfield, \$857.42.
