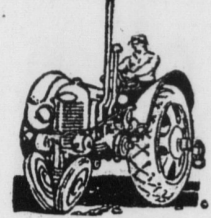

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## New Seasoning Method

In North Carolina a method has been developed to season lumber in a hurry now is seasoned in kilns which are big oven-like affairs. The process often requires a week or longer. It's expensive, slow, and needs expert supervision. The new method requires only a few hours. The lumber is boiled, and the excess moisture removed. The secret is the solution in which the wood is boiled.

## Wild Horses Shot

Wild horses, camels, donkeys and wild hogs have become pests in the farm north of South Australia, causing heavy losses to pasture and farm lands. They multiplied to such an extent during the war that they have become a serious problem. Nearly 5,000 had been shot at one ranch alone and there were just as many left. Planes equipped with machine guns are being used in areas inaccessible to hunters.

## And Some Have None

There are approximately 1,000 hairs per square inch on the scalp or about 120,000 on the average head. Blond's have the finest hair and the greatest quantity, 150,000 one which is the coarsest but redheads have the least hair, sometimes possessing only 90,000. The life of a hair varies from months to four years. Eyelashes have the shortest life span, probably lasting only 150 days.

## Dispelling Odor

Aged furniture sometimes develops unpleasant odors in its interior. If thorough exposure to sunlight or the drawers and other interior parts fails to get rid of the odorants or smelli, or the use of deodorants or anti-mildew preparations shut up in the drawers for several days still fails to achieve the desired results, a brush coat of shellac or varnish is suggested.

## Are Your Ladders Safe?

A rainy day may give you time to check the ladders and stepladders used about the home and farm—and by so doing to prevent accidents. In checking ladders you will do well to replace rusted or broken bolts or nails, loose or weakened rungs.

## Attack on Beetles

Spraying with lead arsenate when beetles are feeding and laying eggs on peaches constitutes the main line of attack against plum curculio. Three applications of the spray are recommended.

## Cleaning Walls

For more satisfactory wall cleaning, use a sack over your broom and brush with light upward strokes instead of downward. This prevents rubbing dust into the wallpaper or painted wall.

## Fence Posts

Replacement fence posts should be cut and allowed to dry. Two or three months of hot dry weather will cure pine posts for treating or for setting in the ground. Green, freshly cut posts should not be used.

## Fewer Chickens Raised in Penna. This Year

A drop of three per cent in the number of chickens raised on farms in Pennsylvania this year compared with 1946, was reported today by the State Department of Agriculture.  
The 1947 total is 34,639,000 against 35,710,000 young chickens raised last year, only one per cent higher than the 10-year average, 1936-1945, a Federal-State survey revealed.  
More than 46 million young chickens were raised in Pennsylvania farms in the years 1943 and 1945. This year's total represents a decline of approximately 12 million from those wartime peak years.

Because of the high cost of feed and labor and the scarcity of farm workers, farmers of Pennsylvania had indicated late in 1946 that they would not increase the size of their flocks this year. Hatchery production for the first six months of 1947 was slightly below that for the same period in 1946. Production in June was 20 per cent below the wartime average for that month.

Richard Hess, Strasburg RD, was awarded the silver cup in the judging contest at the annual Field Day of the Lancaster County Holstein Breeders' Association on Thursday at the Clarence Lyons farm, Mount Joy RD.  
More than 150 attended the meeting. The judging contest occupied the morning. After a picnic lunch, A. G. Bucher, of the Lancaster Co. National Bank, spoke on "Economic Trends in Agriculture." Following a round table discussion of dairy problems, William Ritter reported on the activities of the state association.  
The judging consisted of three classes: aged cows, three-year-old heifers and yearling heifers.
